RAILROAD NEWS.

NEW LINE PLANNED TO TAMPICO BY NATIONAL RYS.

Will Construct 2000 Kilometers in Short Route to the City.

Mexico City, Mex., Nov. 8.—Construction plans of the National Railways of Mexico contemplate an addition of fully 2000 kilometers to the mileage of the government merger system within the next few years.

The construction program includes a line south from Matamoros, on the Rio Grande, to the port of Tampico; an extension from Tampico to the port of Veracruz, and a connecting link with the present merger system at some point in the state of Hidalgo, thereby establishing a short route to Mexico City.

The line from Matamoros to Tampico has been talked of for several years, and before the government merger of railroads the Frisco interests considered its construction. At that time the Mexican Central had plans for a Tampico short line, extending from Apulco, in the state of Hidalgo, to the Gulf port. The international bridge across the Rio Grande at Matamoros, recently opened to traffic, was built with funds supplied jointly by the Frisco and National systems. The Frisco is greatly interested in the National's present plans, and Benjamin L. Winchell, president of the Frisco system, recently visited this capital to confer with merger officials in regard to them. The projected line will open rich sections of the states of Tamaulipas and Veracruz.

Surveys Have Been Made.

Extensive surveys have been made between Matamoros and Tampico, and engineers are now in the field between Tampico and Veracruz. Philip Burkholder is in charge of the work. Soundings are being made to determine the best location for a drawbridge across the Panuco river, near Tampico. It is estimated that this bridge will cost 1,000,000 pesos.

The National has just commenced the construction of a line south from Penjamo, on the Guadalupe division, through the state of Michoacan, to a connection with the Acambaro-Uruapan line at Uruapan. It will be 125 kilometers in length and will open a territory rich in agricultural possibilities and mineral and timber resources. The Acambaro-Uruapan line, built narrow gauge, is being widened and shortened. This work will be completed by next March.

Will Build to Durango.

A line planned for several years to extend from Guiltierrez, a station on the Mexican Central in the state of Zacatecas, to the city of Durango, will be built by the National. The Robert S. Towne interests, which have extensive mineral holdings in sections of Zacatecas that will be opened by this line, made arrangements for its construction a few years ago, and a concession was secured. However, the financial depression interfered with the building, and some time ago the concession was taken over by the merger management. The governments of Zacatecas and Durango will aid with substantial subsidies, and the Towne interests will give some financial assistance. The line will be about 155 miles long, and will serve the Sombrerete, Chalchihuites and Nieves mining districts of Zacatecas, and the Nombre de Dios and other mineral sections of Durango.

The branch lines, aggregating 125 kilometers, are being built from the Veracruz and Isthmus, a merger road, into sugar tobacco districts of the state of Veracruz. These lines will be completed by the middle of next year. In October work was started on a 30 kilometer line in the state of Oaxaca, from the city of Oaxaca to Tlacoahuac, a branch will be built to the Magdalena smelter, near Tlacoahuac.

Pushing Line West.

Good progress is being made in the construction of a line west from the city of Durango to the Murphy timber tract of the Sierra de Durango Lumber company. The distance is 100 kilometers. Surveys have been made for a line from Tepehuanes, the terminus of the Mexican International, another merger road, to the Guanaoqui mining district of Durango, and the district is now being canvassed to determine probable freight. It is said that J. G. White and company, of New York, will build this road. The concession granted by the Durango government guarantees 6 percent interest on the money invested.

TRACK LAYING IN PECOS IS STARTED

Pecos, Texas, Nov. 8.—The construction crew of the Pecos Valley Southern railway is laying the tracks from the company's entrance at the western end of the city to and down G. Main street to where the new station will be erected. This track parallels the Texas & Pacific tracks for about half a mile, both entering the city from the west, the Pecos Valley Southern line turning south half a mile from the business district of the city.

The rails and ties for the extension of the road from Saragosa, the present southern terminus, have arrived, and about two miles of the line has been completed for tracks from Saragosa south.

The intention of the company, as stated by president Carville when in Pecos last month, was to have the track completed to Balmorhea by December 1, and if possible into Phantom Lake, at the foot of the Davis mountains.

TO BUILD BIG COAL CHUTE AND SWITCH AT ROSWELL

Roswell, N. M., Nov. 8.—The New Mexico Eastern railroad is preparing to put in a coal chute at a cost of \$6000 and a switch and cinder pit costing \$5000 in the Roswell yards at once. The building will stand midway between the station and the roundhouse.

Join Carpenters, Who Can't Strike, Because Ministers Have a Union.

FOUR OF THEM NAILING BOARDS

Four El Paso ministers and one layman were literally earning their bread by the sweat of their brows according to the biblical teaching Monday afternoon and Tuesday.

Perched on different corners of the tabernacle, which is being built on the Bassett lots for the Buzgen revival, the ministers and churchmen labored with much flowing of perspiration and acquisition of splinters, to put the roof on the big frame structure in which the revival meetings are to be held next week.

Rev. C. L. Overstreet, of the First Presbyterian church, one of the leading workers in the cause of the evangelistic services, wore a fawn colored sweater, a pair of khaki trousers slightly soiled from much usage, and an old Ike Walton hat.

Rev. Perry James Rice, of the First Christian church, hustled the lumber as the others nailed it to the rafters.

Rev. E. B. Horn, of East El Paso, was one of the lofty workers in the vineyard, while Rev. E. H. Coombs, of the Lutheran church, was assistant to Rev. Mr. Rice in supplying the where-withal for the roof.

I. J. Ayers was the single layman who responded to the call for aid to build the church, and Rev. R. W. Merrill, of the Highland Park Baptist church, was one of the many assistant bosses who called during the working hours to see that the work was being done properly.

An impending strike was reported among the carpenters on the jobs when the preachers appeared, but as the ministers have a union and as all of the bible pounders of the city belong to the Central Labor Union, they were declared eligible to work on the building alongside of the union men. J. C. Hanson is in charge of the construction of the big building, which is to be 100 by 112 feet and will be heated by stoves and with electric lights.

APPROVES UPPER GILA PROPOSITION

Silver City Man, Backed by Philadelphia Capital in \$1,000,000 Project.

Santa Fe, N. M., Nov. 8.—The million dollar power proposition on the upper Gila has been approved by territorial engineer Vernon L. Sullivan. The applicants are Boulware & Johnson, of Silver City, who asked for one hundred second feet of the flow to develop, 4000 horsepower to be used in the Mogollon mining district at \$75 per horsepower per year.

The project has been financed in Philadelphia and will require the expenditure of \$1,200,000. A pipe line 24 miles long was to have been constructed, but it was decided to tunnel a hill, which will reduce the distance just one-half. The dam is to be 80 feet long and 30 feet high and will be of reinforced concrete.

Charged With Cattle Stealing.

Mounted policeman J. W. Collier, arrested Jose and Juan Sienoros, of Encino, Terrance county, on the charge of cattle stealing. They were taken to Vaughn, Guadalupe county, for preliminary hearing. Eliso Trujillo, of Taos, arrested at Tucuman by mounted policeman A. A. Sana, was brought to Santa Fe today and admitted to \$500 bail.
