MUST RENT SPACE FOR POSTOFFICE
El Paso Cannot Have a New Federal Building Inside of Five Years.

Under the most favorable conditions, according to James C. Plant, who is in El Paso making an inspection of postoffice sites, the plans for the new postoffice building in El Paso will not be drawn in less than three years. Two years more will be consumed in getting the appropriation and erecting the building, so the new postoffice will not be a reality in less than five years, he says.

Before that time, the postoffice business at El Paso will have grown to such proportions that outside offices will have to be rented.

"The only way out of the dilemma," said postmaster Smith, "is to go outside of the building and rent additional rooms."

The inspection of sites, which was begun at the chamber of commerce Saturday, was again taken up Monday morning by the inspector and he was engaged all of the day in visiting sites that have been offered.

He will be in Las Cruces Wednesday, November 9, and will return to El Paso on Thursday, to complete the inspection of sites here. At the El Paso hearing A. P. Colos presented a petition to the examiner, signed by a number of business men, asking the inspector not to consider available any site not within the bounds of Franklin Street on the north, Campbell street on the east, First street on the south and Santa Fe street on the west. On the 13 sites which have been submitted, eight of them could qualify under those conditions.

The appropriation for the site, \$50,000, has already been made out the money for the erection of the building is yet to be appropriated.

SELLS IRRIGATION SYSTEM TO AN ALAMOGORDO COMPANY

Alamogordo, N. M., Nov. 8.—Several years ago Merrill H. Fisher commenced work on a hydro electric plant in Box canyon, then he sold to the owners of the Alamogordo Improvement company, which is to erect the plant.

This irrigation system will develop several hundred horse power at a cost of \$50,000. It is probable that a series of plants will be constructed at greater cost. Preliminary construction work under the management of T. M. Morton has commenced.

The plant will do much to reclaim this valley, as power will be cheap.
