PLANS IRRIGATION FOR TWO COUNTIES

Denver Man to Construct a Dam and Reservoir in Bull Gap Canyon.

Las Cruces, N. M., Nov. 16.—A. M. Patten, of Denver, Colo., has been in Las Cruces for the past few days on business connected with a large irrigation project which he and his associates will construct in Lincoln and Chaves counties.

The reservoir is to cover 280 acres and is to be located in Bull Gap canyon in Lincoln county. The ditches will run from the reservoir over land in both counties which is now unproductive on account of lack of water. That the reservoir can be kept filled there is no doubt, as the winter snowfall in the mountains in that region is always great.

Mr. Patten has filed application, accompanied with a map of the proposed reservoir and irrigation system, in the local and office, for the right of way, the application being accepted.

SHIPPING APPLES FROM LAS CRUCES

Las Cruces, N. M., Nov. 16.—Mesilla valley apples are being shipped from Las Cruces on every train to points in Texas, Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico. The El Manzanal orchard is the heaviest shipper, but practically all the orchards in the valley are being drawn upon this year to meet the increased demand for Mesilla Valley apples.

The retail price for this fruit on the local market is 12 for a 40-pound box and there are more buyers than there are boxes available. The Arkansas Black, the wine sap and the Ben Davis are the favorites, as they are good eaters, some growers having kept the fruit until the first of July of the next year.
