Evangelist Praises Red-Headed People and Denounces Corruption.

The evangelist at the big tabernacle, Dr. Bulgin, paid his respects to the redlight district last night. Each evening before beginning his sermon, he reads the questions that have been submitted to him during the day and then answers them. One of the questions asked him last night referred to the redlight district and he answered it hot off the bat by declaring that if the Lord were to remove it, then he could remove it entirely. Then he said: "Whenever a man gets so low as to argue that it is necessary to sell women's virtue for coin, just put a ring in his nose and lead him out to water and call him a gentleman heifer." Some of his other shots during the evening were: "God bless the red headed boy or girl. The red is the iron in their systems and iron sharpens their wits. Who ever heard of a red headed fool? God Almighty save the business men of El Paso from this way of thinking that to belong to the church increases their responsibilities. A man is more responsible for being a rebel against the Lord than if he was a Christian. There is no country on earth which has a better school system than our country. I challenge the world to find a discrepancy in God's word. Cussenheim, a corrupt senator, shows that all men are not equal in this country. You've got men in this town who have put anesthesia on their souls and gone to sleep to believe there is no hell in this world. God does not damn you. You damn yourself. God does not put a gallon into a quart cup. The thing to do is to increase your capacity. One of the questions put to the evangelist last night was: 'If God is supreme, why does he not kill the devil?' The evangelist replied: 'If God were to kill the devil, it would leave too many orphan children around this town.' Future Subjects Announced. An invitation has been extended to all of the fraternal societies to attend this meeting. Bulgin will discuss 'David and Jonathan.' Wednesday evening's subject, 'Was Moses Scientific?' has been arranged, he says, for the Jews, who have been invited to attend this special service. Thanksgiving day will be Dr. Bulgin's busiest 12 hours. He will deliver the union Thanksgiving sermon at 10:30 a. m. in the tabernacle under the auspices of the union churches. At noon he will be invited to talk at the annual dinner given under Y. M. C. A. auspices for the benefit of the Y. M. C. A. annual feast day. In the evening Dr. J. N. McCormack, national organizer for the American Medical society, will deliver his lecture on "Health" at the tabernacle. This will begin at 7 p. m. and will be followed by Dr. Bulgin's famous "Lean Cow" sermon, which characterizes as a lean subject by a lean man on a lean cow who will be made to give plenty of gospel milk. At the union service Thursday morning a charity offering will be taken. Those attending it will also be requested to bring clothing or food for the poor of the city.
