Portland Goes Over.

Portland, Me., Dec. 6.—Following the example of the state in the September election, Portland has gone Democratic, choosing Oakley C. Curtis, Democrat, mayor over the incumbent, Charles A. Strout, Republican, by 703 votes. The city council, which is now Republican, was changed to Democratic, 2 to 16.

Clark Appeals to Washington.

Winnipeg, Man., Dec. 6.—W. R. Clark of Kansas City, president of the Alberta & Great Waterways railway, has appealed to Washington and also to Ottawa, protesting against the bill now before the Alberta legislature which provides for the confiscation of \$8,000,000 subscribed by Americans for the building of the railroad.

Hayward, Wis., Dec. 6.—Mrs. Hattie Dietz, her son Leslie and her daughter Myra, were released on bonds of \$10,000, \$4000 and \$1000, respectively, shortly after their cases had been called here.

Eight New Cholera Cases.

Rome, Italy, Dec. 6.—Eight new cases of cholera have been reported during the last 24 hours.

Express Suspects Released.

Muskogee, Okla., Dec. 6.—Fred Girons, acting express agent; O. Sensenbush, messenger, and W. P. Kelsey, driver, who were arrested, charged with stealing an express case containing \$11,000 in unsigned bills and \$5000 in currency from the Wells-Fargo Express depot here on the night of November 28, have been released. The prosecution decided it had no evidence against the men.

Primaris Undesirable.

Baton Rouge, La., Dec. 6.—The Louisiana general assembly last night voted down a resolution to submit the election of a United States senator to succeed the late H. D. McEnery to the popular vote. The so-called "insurgent" forces, responsible for the resolution, lost the motion by a vote of 45 to 69 in the house and 8 to 27 in the senate.

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Will Reappoint Cockrell.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 6.—Francis M. Cockrell of Missouri is likely to be reappointed by president Taft as a member of the interstate commerce commission. This is said by persons in a position to know as all but settled.

Suicide Clause Barred.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 6.—That the insured-committed suicide may not be pleaded in defence of an action to recover on a life insurance policy in Colorado, was a decision of the supreme court today, which upheld the constitutionality of the state prohibiting insurance organizations from including "suicide" clauses in their policies.

Judge Bars Cigarettes.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 6.—"If you solemnly swear that you will smoke no more cigarettes I shall suspend your fine," said Judge Stapleton in the municipal court to John Watkins, who had been fined for spitting in a street car. Watkins, who is 20 years old, took the pledge and left the courtroom.

Two New Judges.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 6.—Information from an excellent source, indicates that president Taft has determined upon two members of the new court of commerce. They are judge Charles A. Prouty of Vermont and Franklin K. Lane of California, both of whom now are members of the interstate commerce commission.

American's Slayers Arrested.

Fremont, Neb., Dec. 6.—Relatives have received word from the United States ambassador to Mexico that the three Mexicans accused of killing Joseph Ellick, a mining man in Sinaloa, have been arrested. Ellick, who formerly lived in Fremont, was killed and robbed while on the way to pay miners in his employ. His wife is now in Mexico, arranging to bring the body to Fremont.
