Las Cruces Officer Extra-dites Man From Mexico Without Redtape. An entirely new form of effecting the extradition of a man from Mexico was successfully worked Thursday afternoon by E. Moreno, deputy sheriff from Las Cruces. As a result, Martin Martel, charged with the theft of a saddle, was returned to Las Cruces Thursday night, accompanied by the officer.

MEXICAN POLICE CHIEF IS STABBED

Douglas, Ariz., Dec. 16.--Desiderio de Fuentes, chief of police of Agua Prieta, was stabbed in the breast by a Mexican while in Douglas yesterday, but hit the man over the head with his sixshooter. The man who did the stabbing had been in Agua Prieta during the morning and had been ordered to leave after he became drunk and noisy. It is believed he waited for the police chief on the American side and attacked him. The chief was not seriously wounded.

MRS. CLARDY GETS DECREE OF DIVORCE

The divorce suit of Mrs. Allie D. Clardy Swinney against James E. Swinney was granted in the district court Friday afternoon. The plaintiff alleged excessive cruelty and abuse. Mrs. Clardy and Swinney were married June 7, Swinney was a New Yorker and was employed at the Popular Dry Goods company.

CHARGED WITH INSANITY FILES SUIT FOR DIVORCE

Mrs. Mary A. Donnelly, charged in county court by her husband, P. J. Donnelly, with lunacy, has filed suit in the 41st district court for divorce. She also asks an order of injunction preventing her husband and others from disposing of personal property alleged to belong to her. On the charge of lunacy, Mrs. Donnelly was arrested and gave bond for her appearance before Judge Elyar.

WILL CALL MURDER CASE IN 34TH COURT MONDAY

The trial of Miguel Chicoreo, charged with the murder of Augustin Villengran, will be called in the 34th district court Monday, according to present plans. Villengran died on February 12, last, following a dispute, it is alleged, with Chicoreo. The trouble occurred near Chicoreo's ranch at Ysleta, where Villengran also lived.

AWARDS JUDGMENT TO BOTH PLAINTIFF AND DEFENDANT

In justice McClintock's court on Friday afternoon, in the case of Lefkowitz vs. Beasy Walsh, in which plaintiff asked judgment for \$197 on a note, judgment for \$150 was given, and on a cross bill filed by defendant, judgment for \$172 was awarded.

GIZMAN'S WOUNDS ARE REPORTED TO BE SERIOUS

Juan Guzman, who, Wednesday night sustained two stab wounds which penetrated the right lung, was removed to the county hospital Thursday night in an ambulance. His condition has become serious. Reports Friday morning state he is resting easy. His assailants have not been arrested.

MASH FINED \$100. L. I. Mash, a switchman, was fined \$100 in police court Friday morning on a charge of drunkenness and disturbing the peace. He is said to have been intoxicated for several days.

ARRESTED AT BIG 4. On a charge of carrying a pistol, Gonzalo de la Garza was arrested at the Big 4 saloon by officers. Garza is alleged to have threatened a Mexican girl.

The horses came here from the Oakland, Cal. track.

GALENA DISTRICT CATTLE IMPORTED BY BIGHAM & ROSE. Bigham & Rose imported 25 carloads of cattle Friday morning and 26 in the afternoon, all from the Galena district of Chihuahua. Another shipment of about 780 head are expected Sunday, the greater number being for Bigham & Rose, while John T. Cameron will receive about 150 head of the shipment.

DROP INDICTMENT AGAINST WIDMAIER

The indictment charging Albert Widmaier, former manager of the Bristol cafe, with theft by bailee, has been dismissed in the 34th district court. Widmaier was alleged to have left El Paso with \$1400 belonging to F. M. Bos, a race horse owner operating last season on the Juarez course. Widmaier was arrested in Los Angeles but successfully blocked extradition efforts. It is now said that Bos refuses to return and prosecute the case, and that he should have instituted civil rather than criminal action against Widmaier.

McLACHLEN SCORES CHAIRMAN TAWNEY

Washington, D. C., Dec. 16.--Representative McLachlen, of California, in a statement today denounced chairman Tawney of the house appropriations committee for favoring the suppression of official reports of the war department on the alleged military unpreparedness of the United States.

KENO EMPLOYEE IS DEAD OF SMALLPOX

Phil Judd, the employe of the Juarez keno house, who was taken with smallpox early in the week, died Friday afternoon at 2:30 in Juarez.

EXAMINE THREE WITNESSES IN FIRMIN MURDER TRIAL

Hillsboro, Texas, Dec. 16.--After examining three witnesses this morning the state rested in the case of Phillip Firmin, charged with the murder of A. E. Puckett, and the court took a recess to enable the defense's counsel to confer with witnesses. Dr. Free Johnson, in command of the hospital corps; Earl W. Elliott, a private, and Lieut. A. C. Allen, were on the stand. Puckett was shot and killed on a Katy troop train near Hillsboro.

FOX RETURNS FROM THE SAN FRANCISCO MEETING

Eugene Fox, general freight and passenger agent of the E. P. & S. W. system, has returned from San Francisco, where he attended the meeting of western road agents called to check the Phoenix rate schedule regulated in June by the interstate commerce commission. W. C. Barnes, chief clerk of Mr. Fox's department, remained to see to the detail of their adjustments.

GRAND JURY INDICTS SAPP FOR ALLEGED ASSAULT.

San Antonio, Tex., Dec. 16.--The grand jury today returned an indictment against D. F. Sapp, charged with assault to murder city detective Frank Newman, who was shot last January. W. H. Irwin, former chief of police, who was arrested with Sapp in connection with the shooting, was not indicted.

DEMOCRATIC CAUCUS IS TO BE HELD IN JANUARY.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 16.--Minority leader Champ Clark today circulated a petition calling for a Democratic caucus in January which will decide the policy of the next congress and decide on a speaker. Members-elect are invited.

WILL BE ALLOWED TO LEAVE.

Bessie Smith, alias Mrs. Charles Cunningham, is to be allowed to leave the city, it is said in police court circles. She was arrested by officer Barney Early, who has been hunting for her the past week. She has been arraigned in police court previously on other charges, it is said.
