DEMOCRATS OPPOSE THE CONSTITUTION

Convention Held at Santa Fe Is a Joke—Walton Is Unhorsed.

Santa Fe, N. M., Dec. 19.—The Democratic convention on Saturday consisted of 60 men from 16 of the 24 counties in the territory. These 60 men had proxies representing 170 of the 272 delegates which were to have been chosen. It is claimed that some of them had proxies for a faint "yes" while a still fainter "no" was recorded. The whole thing was a demonstration of how five or six men can dominate an entire party that is in as deep a slumber as is the New Mexico Democracy.

But before the Democratic "host" went home, the conservatives had to pay one more price for the unprecedented moderation of the radicals. "Napoleon" Walton was sent to Elba. To make the dose palatable, however, another conservative, W. C. McDonald, of Carrizozo, was elected to succeed the champion of the Democrats in the territorial central committee, and Summers Burkhardt, of Albuquerque, was retained as secretary. Already Bernadotte Jones has visions of a "Cointer" Bureau of Elba, to be set up at the tag end of which there will be no St. Helena. But now to the story: E. C. de Baca, of East Las Vegas, was chairman, and Eugenio Romero, of Lordsburg, was secretary. The committee reported that there were no contests. However, it had wrangled awhile over the knotty question whether chairman W. B. Walton could be regular run to Chicago.

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POSTAL SAVINGS BANKS OF THE WORLD; FACTS GATHERED BY U. S.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 19.—The United States has been the last nation of importance to establish postal savings banks. Practically every other nation has them in successful operation now.

One of the latest publications of the National monetary commission, entitled "The Postal Savings Banks of the World," shows the growth and development of postal savings banks in every quarter of the earth from the beginning in the United Kingdom in 1851 to the present time, when the system has been extended not only through the continent of Europe, but to the colonies, even in Tasmania, the federated Malay states, and southern Nigeria.

While the United States in this year preparing for a beginning with 44 banks, the faraway gold coast of Africa has more than \$1,000,000 in deposits. The Dutch East Indies have \$2,000,000; Formosa, the highest total of all, has \$3,000,000, and Egypt has nearly \$2,000,000.

In continental Europe and in greater nations the system is much more extensive. In France there are more than 5,000 depositors, with average deposits of \$56. Italy has 5,000,000 with an average deposit of \$55. Belgium has 2,000,000, with an average of \$63, and Russia has 1,700,000, with an average of \$72. Japan, which pays the highest interest of all, has 3,000,000 depositors, with deposits of \$45,000,000, but the average deposit is lowest of all, only about \$5.

The United Kingdom was the pioneer, having established her system in 1851. This postal savings bank system has grown steadily, until in 1908 there were over 11,000,000 depositors, with deposits of \$781,754,533. For the whole period from 1851 to 1908 the total surplus profits covered into the treasury amount to \$11,142,425. However, since 1902 there has been an annual average deficit of about \$600,000.
