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THE WATER PLANT IS AT LESS EXPENSE

Superintendent Race's Re-
port Submitted—Council
Adopts Street Grade
Ordinance.

The report of the operation of the
water plant during November was sub-
mitted to the Thursday morning meet-
ing of the city council, and according to
the statement of superintendent W. E.
Race, the expense the past month was
lower than it has ever been during the
history of the company. The total num-
ber of gallons of water pumped was
77,853,723, at an average cost per 1000
gallons of \$.0471.

Total receipts during the month
amounted to \$15,521.74, including water
rent, \$2496.25; deposits paid to guaran-
tee payment of water tax, \$512.20, and
deposits previously paid \$4183.50. Ex-
penditures during November totaled
\$3627.08.

Included in the expenditures is the
sum of \$500 for corporation tax, part
of which goes to the state of Texas and
the balance to the state of West Vir-
ginia, in which the International Water
company is chartered. It was explained
by city attorney Caldwell to alderman
Blumenthal who asked as to the \$500
expense that it was necessary unless
the city could pay \$477,000 in outstand-
ing bonds.

The report of the earning and operat-
ing expenses of the water plant for No-
vember announced actual receipts of
\$12,362.96 and expenditures of \$2974.65,
leaving a balance of \$3088.11.

Many Plans to Prop.
Supt. Race also reported that he had
been forced to discontinue water ser-
vice to a number of patrons as a result
of their neglect to pay the water rent.

His action was endorsed by the council.
Supt. Race also reported laying out
main on portions of West Boulevard,
Court street, North Oregon and North
Campbell streets.

Mayor Reports on Bonds.
A report of the disposition of the
water works purchasing bonds to the
International Water company was made
by mayor C. E. Kelly. The bonds netted
\$390,000, of which \$90,000 has been re-
tained for the operating expense of the
water plant. The report was approved
by the council.

Petitions referred include a claim for
\$173 alleged damage by William Lowe
as a result of a falling wall at 205
South Stanton street, said to have been
caused by the city employees piling lumber
against the wall. The installation of an
arc light is asked by citizens living
near the corner of Missouri and Santa
Fe streets.

On the motion of alderman McGhee
and interest amounting to
\$138.74 was remitted on the back taxes
dating from 1884 on the east 60 feet
of the southwest quarter, block 46,
Mills map, amounting to \$42.13, on the
condition that the owner of M. A. Polan, who owns the
property. The petitioner is represented
by former mayor Jos. W. Sweeney.

Poultry District Created.
An ordinance creating a wholesale
poultry district was adopted. The dis-
trict is bounded on the north by Second
street, on the south by the Rio Grande,
on the east and west by the alley on
either side of South Santa Fe street.
Fowls not to exceed 10 lbs. be kept
in the following district: Bounded on
the north by Missouri street; on the
east by Campbell street, south by
First and on the west by Santa Fe
street.

Tax Ordinance Read.
An ordinance assessing a tax levy of
\$1.30 for city purposes for the year be-
ginning March 1, 1911, was read the
second time. The levy is the basis of
major Kelly's report of \$58,900.
The estimate of city engineer Todd
of \$415.23 in favor of the Texas Bitu-
lithic company for paving on South
Durango street, was adopted.

City Physician's Report.
Dr. W. H. Anderson, city physician,
reported 18 births and 14 deaths the
past week. Of the deaths six were
Americans, 7 were Mexicans and one
negro. Tuberculosis caused four of the
deaths.

The report of contagious diseases in-
cludes three smallpox patients; diphe-
theria, 7; scarlet fever, 1; typhoid fever,
six.

Houses razed and repaired and being
rebuilt under the supervision of the
city department number 71, according
to the report. Houses razed number 52,
October and \$1015.55 for November.

The report of city scavenger Alderete
announced receipts of \$985.55 during
