GOVERNMENT HAS GOOD PLACES OPEN

Examinations to be Held in This City for Civil Service Positions.

There are several new jobs waiting to be filled for Uncle Sam and examinations for this purpose are to be held at the local federal building during January and February.

There will be an examination for vacancies for expert and special agent in the bureau of labor on January 18 and 19, while on the two following days there will be an examination for research and editorial assistant in the same department.

Qualified persons are urged to enter the examination for a teacher of agriculture in the Indian service at Carlisle, Pa., the salary being \$380.

On January 21 there will be examinations for a scientist in soil culture at salaries ranging from \$1600 to \$2000 per annum. On the same day there will be an examination for physical director for the Haskell institute in Kansas, the salary to be \$800 a year.

February 8 has been set aside for the examination of applicants for positions as assistant in the national museum ranging from \$900 to \$1800 per year. Those desiring to fill vacancies as assistants curator in the national museum department of geology will be examined on this day and the following day.

There will be an examination on February 8 for vacancies as mounted inspectors in the immigration service to be assigned to Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Utah, Nevada, Arkansas, California, Oklahoma and Louisiana. The salary is \$1280 per annum.

ROBBER ATTACKS THREE WOMEN AND SECURES 25 CENTS

Mrs. Emma Welborn, while walking home in company with Mrs. Ola Nichols and Miss Nettie Hester, was held up by a robber and her purse taken.

The attack occurred on Magoffin avenue about 7 o'clock Wednesday night. The man grabbed the pocket book which was attached to Mrs. Nichols' wrist, but when she refused to release it, he tried to wrench it from her. Not succeeding in this he tripped her and finally obtained the purse.

The other two women were not attacked, the man being frightened away by their screams.

None of the party were hurt besides having a severe scare. The pocket-book only contained 25 cents. The robber is described as being short of stature and a little stout. He was a blonde and wore a dark overcoat.

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ALLEGED TO HAVE TOO MANY WIVES

Man Arrested in El Paso on Telegram From Los Angeles Sheriff.

As a result of having one wife in El Paso, and another, it is alleged, in Los Angeles, Calif., Leroy Johnson, alias Vaughn, is detained at the police station on a charge of being a fugitive from justice.

He was arrested Wednesday by city detectives on information furnished by W. A. Hammel, sheriff of Los Angeles county, California, who in a message to chief of detectives Stansel states that he has a warrant for Johnson's arrest on a charge of bigamy. Johnson, when told of the charge against him, refused to go back, and extradition papers have been asked. Sheriff Hammel is expected to arrive within a few days.

Johnson has been in El Paso and Juarez for the past two months, part of the time working as a bartender in an over-the-river saloon. His wife has been living at the Avalon rooming house, 212 1/2 San Antonio street, and Johnson was arrested when he came over to El Paso Wednesday to see her.

Mrs. Johnson, when interviewed Thursday morning, stated that she was married to Johnson two years ago and that they came to El Paso from Los Angeles two months ago. She expressed implicit faith in her husband and said she would exert every influence in his behalf. She expects to return to California with him.

TRASHY BASEMENTS AND DUMB WAITERS CAUSE MOST FIRES

New York, Dec. 29.—Edward F. Croker, chief of the New York fire department, told the Merritt joint legislative committee, that if his department were granted by legislation the police powers he wished, he could cut the fire loss in New York city 25 percent the first year and he did not know how much the second year.

Rag shops and refuse in the tenement cellars, he said, caused most city fires. Inside stairways and dumb waiter shafts spread most of them and tall buildings hampered the department in fighting them, more than anything else. About 85 feet, seven stories, should be the limit of height for any building, and dumb waiters should be done away with throughout the country.

Y., Dec. 29.—Black handers are believed to be responsible for another of the frequent East side bomb explosions today, which wrecked a grocery store on East Thirtieth street belonging to an Italian who had received letters demanding \$3000. One person was seriously injured. The shock caused a panic in the neighborhood and did several thousand dollars of damage to buildings and nearby property.

BISBEE EDITOR IS MADE INSPECTOR OF CUSTOMS

Bisbee, Ariz., Dec. 29.—L. E. Gould, editor of the Review, has been appointed mounted customs inspector and will be stationed at Douglas.

H. Fink, who represents a group of Pennsylvania capitalists, has arrived from Pittsburgh and will proceed to the Chiricahua mountains to examine a group of claims which the eastern people are going to develop.

Ernest Duber, who was stabbed by Italians in a recent fight which resulted in the death of Parker Bowling, a negro farmer, killed his father-in-law, seriously wounded his wife and 10-year-old daughter, set fire to his home and, barricading himself in a cotton gin, shot seven negroes, two of whom probably will die.

With his last shot Johnson killed himself, but, before doing so, set fire to the gin, which, with a quantity of cotton was destroyed.

ANOTHER MAN TO TRY TO CROSS ATLANTIC IN AIRSHIP

Berlin, Ger., Dec. 29.—Joseph Brucker, who has announced his intention of attempting in March or April next to cross the Atlantic from the Cape Verde islands to the Barbadoes in the airship Suchard, will utilize a novel system to keep the gas cool and prevent loss from radiation.

This will be accomplished by sprinklers constructed at the top of the envelope, which will spray water over the surface of the balloon. The water supply will be hand drawn from the ocean in torpedo shaped cylinders offering a minimum of resistance to the wave and after being taken on board will be pumped through a rope to the sprinklers.

Brucker proposes to carry a crew of six in his craft, which will be equipped with two motors, each of 100 horsepower. A non-sinkable life boat will be taken along. He hopes to arrive on the other side after four or five days and nights in the air.

GETS \$100,000 FOR HIS DISCOVERY OF CUSTOMS FRAUDS

Washington, D. C., Dec. 29.—Richard Carr, the customs detective who discovered the steel springs in the scales on the American Sugar Refining company's dock at Williamsburg and furnished most of the evidence through which more than \$3,000,000 were returned to the federal government, will get a reward as a New Year's greeting. Carr's moiety was \$100,000. He was paid \$20,000 sometime ago. The urgency deficiency bill carries \$90,000, and of that \$80,000 will go to Carr.

NEW YORK TO HAVE A COLLEGE FOR FIRE FIGHTERS

New York, Dec. 29.—Hereafter New York's fire fighters must have college degrees. They must be graduates of the city fire college, the establishment of which is announced by fire commissioner Waldo, which will open next Monday.

It is said to be the first institution of the kind in the world and all present members of the department as well as recruits will be required to attend.

Fifteen subjects will be included in the curriculum, embracing everything from general fire fighting to gasoline motor engineering and first aid to the injured.
