REBELS RETREAT FROM GUERRERO TO HILLS

Are Short on Ammunition, But Have Not Given Up The Fight—Only Move Headquarters—Still Nagging Navarro.

(By C. D. Hagerly, Associate Press War Correspondent.) Chihuahua, Mex., Jan. 7.—Guerrero has been abandoned as the base of operations of the insurrecto forces, according to confirmatory advices brought in today by Americans from the Guerrero vicinity. Since the last fight at Pedernales, Orozco, the insurrecto leader, has been busy with most of his force transferring supplies to the mountains west of Guerrero. A light force was kept in front of Navarro to impede his advance, although there was no hope of checking it.

The picture is partly finished and submitted free, and patrons understand from the start that the picture is not to be completed and delivered unless it is to be framed by us and hung on the wall or otherwise displayed to advertise our work. We go further and guarantee a perfect likeness or refund the money already paid. We have been here several months and can give bank references as to our responsibility."

LUMBER PLANT AT MONAHANS BURNS

Pecos, Texas, Jan. 7.—A telegram from Monahans said that the warehouse, lumber yard and sheds of the Pruett Lumber company and most market located near by have been destroyed by fire. The railroad coal chutes also were on fire. The lumber company is a branch of the Pruett Lumber company, of Pecos. The loss is \$400, partially covered by insurance. The plant will immediately be rebuilt, according to advices given out by the president of the company here today.

SILBERBERGS BUY VALUABLE CORNER

Will Improve at Stanton and Myrtle for Mercantile Purposes.

A. and R. Silberberg have bought the vacant lot at the corner of Myrtle and Stanton streets, one of the most valuable corners in the city, and will improve it very soon for retail purposes; \$10,000 or \$15,000 will probably be put into a building for the present. This lot was bought by The Herald in March, 1907, for its permanent home. A building of eight stories to cost about \$180,000 was planned for the corner, and a loan of \$110,000 had been negotiated with a big life insurance company, conditional upon the Robertson insurance law not passing the Texas legislature. The law was enacted a few weeks later, and before new plans for financing the building had been completed, The Herald bought the splendid property on Pioneer Plaza, where its permanent home is now located.

KENNEDY ASKS BONUS OF \$100,000

Ed Kennedy, who is promoting the railroad from Pecos to Roswell, to connect there with the line he is promoting to Oklahoma, made a definite proposition to the chamber of commerce this afternoon. He asks the city to give him a bonus of \$100,000 and a right-of-way through the country. He is willing to accept the Courchesne franchise and give the owners stock in his road to the value of what they have had to spend upon it. The stipulations are that the city is to pay him \$50,000 in installments as the grading work progresses from the county line into the city and the other \$50,000 when the steel has been laid into the city.
