

SOME MINES NOT DAMAGED BY REPORTS

Shipments From Nogales and Agua Prieta Increase During January.

Cananea, Sonora, Mexico, Feb. 7.—With all the revolutionary talk in Sonora and disturbances in the mining industry does not seem to be suffering any great hardships, as in fact the shipments from this state to the United States shows an increase in January over that of December.

Mexico City, Mex., Feb. 7.—Transfers of Mexican mining property involving cash securities to the amount of \$1,000,000, pesos, or \$17,500,000, United States currency, were made in the 12 months of 1910.

The year saw pending the largest deal in the history of Mexican mining, that of the purchase of the Campo Morado properties of the Reforma Mining and Milling company, in the state of Guerrero by the Exploration company of England, Mexico, for 20,000,000 pesos.

At the port of Agua Prieta the shipments for January amounted to 11,412 tons, compared to 10,910 in December. The value of these shipments in round numbers was 1,200,000 pesos in January, compared to 900,000 pesos in December. The increase was brought about by the increase in operations of the Moctezuma company at Nacozari. This company shipped 981 tons in December and 10,351 in January. El Tiro shipments were increased 73 tons; Churubundi, 100 tons; Vaquero, 40 tons; La Detroita, 52 tons. The principal increase in values was in Copper, \$51,708 pesos in January, to \$30,700 in December. Silver and gold showed decreases.

Smelter Still Operating. In Cananea the smelter is continuing operations with five furnaces. The January output has not yet been made public, but it is stated that it will compare favorably with that of December. The new construction work is being rapidly completed. Three Mas-Douglas roasters have been completed and the dust chambers are almost completed also.

The new work of installation at the power house has been completed. A. W. Wood has returned home from his Limtrote property, which is located southwest of Cananea near the San Miguel river and about 35 miles west of Pasa station on the Sonora railroad. He reports that he has been making rapid headway on sinking and drifting and that some very rich silver ore has been uncovered. One assay ran as high as \$600 ounces, but the average is about 100 to 200 ounces. Ten men are at work on the property. The mine is between Huapala and Opodene, and about 12 miles east of the San Miguel river.

English Money Invested. The Santa Gertrudis purchase was followed by an important investment of English capital in Mexican mines. The mines of the Santa Eulalia Exploration company and the San Gregorio y Anexas and Esmeralda Anexas properties, all in the Santa Eulalia district of Chihuahua, were bought by the Exploration company of England and Mexico, the deals approximating 1,500,000 pesos. Late in the year Denny brothers, well known English mining engineers, were engaged to look after the interests of the Santa Gertrudis property, in the Pachuca district of Hidalgo for 600,000 pesos, and the Dos Carlos and adjoining properties, also in the Pachuca district, were taken over by London interests on basis of several hundred thousand pesos.

The Hidalgos Deal. One of the most important deals involving American capital was the purchase of control of the Hidalgo Mining and Smelting company, in the Pachuca district of Hidalgo, by the Hidalgo and Durango railroad, for \$1,500,000 gold. Men interested in the Alvarado Mining and Milling company of the Pachuca district of Chihuahua were principally concerned in the purchase. The American Smelting and Refining company acquired the mines and smelter of the Matehuala district of San Luis Potosi, at less than the par value of the latter company, holding 1,000,000 gold. Late in 1910 American interests, said to be the Guggenheims, closed negotiations for the properties of the Segurama Mining company, in the Zacualpan district of the state of Mexico. Guaymas, in the state of Sonora, was bought by the Marcus Daily interests for 500,000 pesos, and the Proano mines, in the Fresnillo district of Zacatecas, were bought by the Santa Rita Copper company in Utah, for the purpose of reporting the additional capacity of the mill to treat the ore. His report was favorable and the owners, Stallforth & Hermano, of this city, are now inviting estimates for the erection of a 20 ton cyanide mill for free milling gold ore.

Ignacia Lease. P. B. Butler of this city has leased the Ignacia mine, situated in the east side of town, from the Ignacia Mining company, and will commence work within a few days to sink a shaft on the north end of the property. Leases Mill in Magistral. Louis Seliger has leased the Lustre Mining company in the Magistral district the 10 stamp mill and is now treating his ore in the mill. Seliger is working several properties of his own, besides leasing the Colorado and Cruz Negra properties in the same district. Consistencia, Las Sauces. F. E. Hine, owner of the Consistencia mine and mill in the Las Sauces district, near Santa Maria del Oro, left here for El Paso to make purchases of new plates for his mill. Upon the installation of these work will be resumed with renewed vigor. Bazanapa Group Sold. The Bazanapa Mining company has sold its group of mines near Guadalupe y Calva through the local office of Chihuahua to an American company for a large sum. The new owners will start work forthwith. The Galena mine, situated near Guadalupe y Calva in the Matina district, has been sold by the owner, Tiburcio Garcia, to an English syndicate, who will make extensive improvements and commence work very shortly. L. C. Triplett. Mr. Triplett has resigned as manager of the Alvarado Mining and Milling company and left for Guajuato to take a similar position with the Guajuato Development company. William McLaughlin, from Durango, has succeeded Mr. Triplett. Resumption Looked For. A more general resumption of mining operations is looked forward to, beginning now, later than March 1 of this year. The several deals consummated during the past few months will have a tendency to increase the output of the camp. The Veta Colorado mill will start to grind ore on or about February 6; the Alvarado mill is grinding night and day and those in charge expect themselves as well pleased with the results accomplished.

WHICH TO EXPLORE RECONCENTRATOR

New Tramway From Concentrator to Townsite Near Completion.

Globe, Ariz., Feb. 7.—One of the churn drills employed on the property of the Miami Copper company has been moved to the Red Spring claim, north of the center of the company's holdings. It is intended to thoroughly explore the ground as soon as possible and an additional crew will be put on the drill at once, thus making two shifts of 12 hours each. This hole is located 1000 feet north and about 800 feet west of the No. 4 shaft, the main working shaft of the company.

BIG DIVIDENDS IN MINING BUSINESS

The Present Year Expected to Be Better Than That of 1910.

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 7.—Judging by reports made to the Mining World for the month of January there is reason to believe that the year 1911 will prove a better year in point of dividends paid by American mines and works than was 1910. A study of the reports shows that 44 American mining properties yielded profits sufficiently large to enrich shareholders to the extent of \$11,504,608. In addition to this amount are the declarations of four securities holding corporations which distributed among their shareholders \$1,254,588, making the January dividend disbursements total \$12,759,196. In comparison with January, 1910, the dividend payments made last month show an increase of \$2,678,123 and an increase of eight companies participating. As compared with January, 1909, the 1911 disbursements show an increase of \$11,400,000. The number of companies contributing nearly one-half of \$3,897,641 in the total amount paid. Of the 44 mines and works paying dividends in January, 34 are in the gold-silver-lead-silver class, and they contributed nearly one-half of the month's total, or \$5,235,215. Of these 34 companies 17 operate in the United States and they paid dividends in January totaling \$2,948,252. Of this amount Goldfield Co. contributed over three-fifths, or \$1,724,542. Seven Canadian companies, all operating in the Cobalt district, contributed \$1,380,450, while 10 Mexican companies contributed \$1,279,353. Seven copper companies, all operating properties in the United States, paid dividends in January totaling \$3,570,600 and Anaconda, under its new organization, was responsible for nearly two-thirds of this, or \$2,110,000. Two metallurgical companies paid January dividends totaling \$1,975,779, \$1,375,000 of which was paid by the American Smelting & Refining company.

SELECT SITE FOR TUCSON SMELTER

Tucson, Ariz., Feb. 7.—Samuel W. Taylor, head of the Taylor Engineering company of New York, arrived here Monday to confer with H. J. Thompson of the Arizona Consolidated Mining and Smelting company regarding the site for the custom smelter to be erected here. The construction work, it is stated, is to be done by the Taylor company.

REPORT IS MADE BY THE BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION.

Bisbee, Ariz., Feb. 7.—The annual report of the Copper Queen company shows that there was paid into the Benevolent Association of the company, in 1910, \$46,023.48 by the members of the association and \$25,000 by the company. Expended on account of accidental deaths in Bisbee, \$14,250; in Douglas, \$5555; in Slickhorn, \$7145; in Douglas, \$4427.50. For injuries, \$10,829.51. Seventy-five percent of the company's employes are members of this association.

MINES AT NACOSARI ARE SHIPPING GOOD TONNAGE OF ORE

Within the past few days at Nacozari, Sonora, new mines have been making shipments. One of the most promising properties is the Agua Buena, located near Nacozari and owned by C. B. Bell, of Douglas, Ariz.; W. T. Smith and A. L. Warner of Duluth, Ariz. The prospect has been known as a good one for some time. The work on the tunnel had not gone far, when rich streaks of silver ore were encountered, which soon merged into a high grade streak 21 inches wide, and assaying high. A small carload of the ore was shipped to the Copper Queen smelter at Douglas. The car netted clear of all charges \$3000. The ore is now on the dump awaiting shipment.

PREPARE FOR CHLORING WORK AROUND TOMBSTONE

Tombstone, Ariz., Feb. 7.—Preparations are being made for considerable churning in the Tombstone mining district, many mines of the Tombstone Consolidated having been leased this week. General manager Frank L. Fowler of the Royal Guard Mine company, has returned from El Paso where he went with a shipment of ore to the smelters in the Pass city.

KILLED BY FALL FROM A SCAFFOLD

Not Known Whether Scaffold Broke or Man Had Vertigo.

Bisbee, Ariz., Feb. 7.—Henry M. Cook, until recently employed as the Junction mine, met instant death by falling from a scaffold at the new compressor building having his skull fractured and his limbs broken. Cook's mother, Mrs. A. Micol, of Portland, Ore., has been notified. Whether the scaffolding on which Cook was working gave way or he was attacked by vertigo, from which he had not yet been ascertained. Judge Murphy will hold an inquest upon the body.

TUCUMCARI SOLDIER BOYS ARE VICTIMS OF PRACTICAL JOKER.

Tucumcari, N. M., Feb. 7.—Tucumcari felt the first taste of war when O. F. Edler, captain of company L, New Mexico national guards, stationed at this city, received the following message supposedly through the local telegraph office: "By order of governor Mills, muster in company L immediately, and hold in readiness to proceed to the front." Signed, "A. S. Brooks, adjutant general."

Constantly D. Twomey and officer Lewis Wright have returned after a fruitless but exciting pursuit of the two juvenile horse borrowers who have burned adventures. The boys were tracked by the hoof marks of their horse for about 15 miles, the officers having lost the trail as they approached the old railroad grade on account of slag deposits thereabouts.

At length, firing of the suspense, one perhaps, thinking some reply were forthcoming to the general's order, the captain betook himself to the telegraph office, seeking further notice, and, incidentally, to inquire as to transportation facilities.

Defective electric wiring caused a small fire at the residence of Mr. Roberts on Higgins hill at 12:45 yesterday. Damage, \$50.

Inquiry disclosed the fact that there was no duplicate telegram at the railway office. Furthermore, the company had received no notification of a possible need of transportation. So the captain has a heavy load. The boys in khaki were dismissed.

GOLD CLAIMS IN YUMA FIELD MERGE

The owners of a number of gold mining claims in the Castle Dome district, 40 miles from Yuma, Ariz., have merged their holdings into the Big Eye Mining company. The Savalla mines, consisting of nine claims north of Vile, have been purchased by the G. A. company, of Parker, Ariz., from L. M. Bailey, and W. R. Bailey. The claims owned by the Orphan Copper company are to be thoroughly explored by means of shafts, sweaters and perhaps life partners. Considerable exploration work has already been done upon the property, and considerable good copper ore was brought to light.

Reports have been received that several persons were killed in a long range battle between striking Greco miners camped in the hills, and only one name is given, that of Thomas Jackson, a deputy sheriff, who undoubtedly is dead.
