

MISTAKE CAUSES JAILED TO TRY TO DISARM RANGER AND GET KILLED

T. Lopez Thinks Man With Prisoner Is a Prisoner Armed and Meets His Death in Scuffle.

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—Shot through the body with a 45 calibre bullet from a Colt's pistol, Tranquilino Lopez, guard of the Dona Ana county jail, lived from 10:30 o'clock Saturday night until 6:25 o'clock Sunday morning, when he passed away, attended by his son and the Catholic priest, at the guard's room in the jail.

The starting of the affair was trivial, the ending tragic. Lambert Rheinhart and Manuel Candelaria, while celebrating in the Blue Ribbon saloon on Saturday evening, became more boisterous and noisier than the law judges to be had in the place, and they were placed under arrest by Fred Higgins, a special member of the New Mexico mounted police. The officer conducted the offenders to the county jail to turn them over to the jailor for safe keeping.

Word was then sent to the sheriff and when they arrived at the jail door, Rheinhart called to the jailor to look out for himself, as they had a man there with a gun in his hand. This was the officer. The jail door was opened and Lopez at once grabbed ranger Higgins around the waist and started to disarm him, when the gun was discharged, the bullet striking the guard in the groin, passing through the body and lodging just under the skin to the right of the base of the spine. The jailor then assisted the wounded guard and together they got Higgins's gun away and looked him up before learning that he was an officer.

Word was then sent to the sheriff and Dr. Sexton. The doctor found the wounded man suffering from the shock and was unable to make a careful investigation. He administered stimulants to overcome the shock sufficiently so that he could remove the bullet and see what the shot had done. But Lopez never recovered, and after 3 o'clock, was unable to talk, dying at 6:25. There was no external bleeding outside of two or three drops of blood from the wound.

Higgins will be given his preliminary hearing before justice of the peace Manuel Lopez today. He refused to make any statement for publication other than that he was sorry that the prisoner had died.

Higgins was a sheriff of Chaves county for three consecutive terms and is well known and liked in that section of the territory. He was also town marshal of Roswell for a while and held a high steam in that town. The present sheriff of Chaves county, Mr. Ballard, is his personal friend and has been wired to come to Las Cruces.

Higgins was given a commission as special member of the mounted police by the governor and was sent here to investigate cattle stealing, work having been received that there was considerable work of that kind being done in this county. He has been here for over a month, except for a few days at a time, when he would be out on the ranges in the discharge of the duties which sent him here. He has been peaceable and conducted himself well, to all appearance, since being in Las Cruces.

According to the jailor, Fidel Sanchez, and the two prisoners whom Higgins had under arrest, the officer made no statement to the guard or to the other members of the mounted police, but entered the jail with his pistol in his hand. Neither the jailor nor the dead guard knew him nor knew that he was an officer. In fact, there were very few people in Las Cruces who did not know him, except for a few of his style to advise himself of his special duty. According to eye-witnesses of the arrest in the saloon Higgins displayed his star to the men he arrested. He was strictly within his authority in making the arrest, as members of the mounted police have power to arrest any disturbers of the peace or other violators of the law in any part of New Mexico.

HAS POSITION IN TEXAS. Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—Edward Redding, a graduate of the New Mexico Agricultural college, who has been engaged for some time in the irrigation census work of the reclamation department of the United States department of agriculture, has gone to Buena Vista, Texas, where he will be associated with territorial engineer Vernon L. Sullivan, who is in charge of a large irrigation project which has been commenced there.

INSURRECTO JAILED BY SHERIFF LUCERO Officers of Las Cruces Are Also Searching for Others.

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—Upon advice received from the United States officers at El Paso, sheriff Felipe Lucero Saturday arrested Ignacio Oaxa, who was riding a horse with a Mexican brand. He stated to the sheriff that he had come up here to buy goats, but confessed that he had been sent by provisional governor Abram Gonzales to investigate the condition of the nine insurgents who are confined in the Dona Ana county jail. It has also been learned that there were several more insurgents in the vicinity of La Union, and deputy sheriff Eugenio Moreno, in company with an officer of the United States immigration service at El Paso, will arrive here Saturday night, left Sunday morning for that vicinity in search of the men.

RAILS RECEIVED FOR LAS CRUCES RAILWAY

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—The rails for which the promoters of the Las Cruces railway have been waiting for over two weeks, have arrived and the work of completing the track to the depot and from the Foster lane to the college will immediately begin. With good weather the road will be completed this week ready for the operation of trains.

DONA ANA COUNTY REPUTES PROHIBITIONISTS' CHARGES

RECEIVES 25,000 FEET TREES FOR VALLEY RANCH.

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—Dr. W. C. Field has received from a home state a shipment of 25,000 Bartlett pear trees, which he will plant on his ranch just west of town. The trees received bear the inspection stamp of the state of Iowa and are free from any of the pests to which such trees are liable.

IMPROVING RANCH.

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—Fay Sherry, who owns the former Shropshire place, about three miles northwest of Las Cruces, consisting of 500 acres, is making extensive improvements this year. He has about 400 acres in cultivation and under fence, and is now fencing 40 acres more, which he has planted to wheat. He expects to get the entire tract into cultivation within the next year.

RETURNS FROM ARIZONA.

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—Earl Patterson, engineer in charge at the Leaburg diversion dam, returned Saturday from Arizona, where he had been for several days obtaining data on the Salt River irrigation project for the purpose of the reclamation service. He found 240,000 acres of land which could be irrigated under the dam, all of which is being put into cultivation rapidly.

HEAVY SNOW ON MOUNTAINS.

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—One of the heaviest snows of the past five years has fallen on the Organ mountains since Friday the mountains have been covered with a heavy white mantle from the base to the highest peaks. The rain of Friday night continued in Las Cruces intermittently all day Saturday and Saturday night, thoroughly soaking the ground.

NEW LUMBER YARD.

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—Las Cruces is to have a third lumber yard. R. P. Porter and W. R. Bradford have been covering the ground for the purpose of starting the new business. The yard will be located at the Thompson-Porter Commission company's property, just west of the Santa Fe station.

GOES TO PECOS CITY.

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—Herbert Stewart will leave Las Cruces within the next few days for Pecos City, Tex. He will have charge of the substitution of the Texas experiment station, which is located there. He is a New Mexico Agricultural college graduate.

SCHOOL EXERCISES.

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—Tuesday, February 21, will be observed by the public schools of Las Cruces with exercises in commemoration of Washington's birthday anniversary, in which the children will fill the entire program.

IMPROVING LESTER TRACT.

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—Claude Henry and Earl W. Lewis have secured control of the Lester tract near the Agricultural college and are making a number of improvements in it. This year they are planting wheat.

INCREASES ALFALFA ACREAGE.

Las Cruces, N. M., Feb. 20.—Oscar C. Snow is busily engaged this month in breaking and leveling a considerable acreage of raw land, which he will put in alfalfa. He has 40 men employed at the present time.

AIR COMPRESSING PLANT PURCHASED

Butters's Mill to Resume After Long Term of Idleness.

Cananea, Mexico, Feb. 20.—An air compressing plant has been purchased by the Phelps Dodge company, which is operating near the Pihares mine in the Nacozari district, and drilling in the future will be done by means of air drills. The equipment has been purchased in El Paso and has already been shipped to the property.

MILL IS OVERHAULED.

The Butters mill, recently acquired by the Mines Company of America, is being completely overhauled, and when all the repairs are completed, and when all the repairs and additions have been completed the mill will resume operations, after a long term of idleness. Huntington mills, amalgamation pans, etc., are also being installed. The Colorado mill of the company is also being completely overhauled and when the two mills are operating again the combined tonnage will amount to about 16,000 tons monthly.

Work Is Suspended.

Work has been suspended for the present at the Juanita property north of Cananea. The property is owned by the Shattuck-Pattison crowd, and when L. C. Shattuck, of Bisbee, was here recently he ordered the work to cease. He stated that one of the shafts had reached a depth of 255 feet and another 75 feet, and that the showings at these depths did not warrant further work at present.

To Resume Operations.

George H. King, president, and J. W. Christy, vice president of the Minneapolis Copper company, were recently at the property of the company, which is located near Campus. They are here to examine the plans for resuming operations in the near future. The mines were closed down in July of last year.

PROPOSED ROAD TO TAP IRON AND COAL.

Albuquerque, N. M., Feb. 20.—The proposed Farmington railroad will concentrate a section rich in iron and coal, says Col. D. K. B. Sellers, who was active in making the former survey of the road. These deposits are directly along the line of the road out of Farmington. The field has never been tapped and the construction of the proposed road would make it accessible and bring the valuable products immediately into market.

THE EMPLOYEES' HOLDINGS.

The Empires Mining company, a recent incorporation, has added 15 more pertenencias to its holdings, making a total of 110 now in the possession of the company, which will transfer its holdings to the American company, the Phelps Dodge Mining and Development company. The new denouncement is the "Golden Cross," which is located in the Magdalena district. A contract was recently let for 200 feet of work to be done at the Major Dome property, which is located three miles from the Oversight mine of the Cananea Consolidated company. It adjoins the property of the Greene-Cananea on the west and the West Cananea on the east. The contract calls for 100 feet of work in the shaft and 100 feet of drifting.
