BIG SHIPMENTS OF CATTLE TO BE MADE Roswell, N. M., March 3.—Frank Divers has ordered 10 cars for cattle shipments from Elkins in April and C. L. Ballard & Co. have ordered 176 cars for the same month, their shipments to be made from Riverside yards.

Rev. Geo. W. Crile, a Lutheran minister, has bought a 40 acre plot in the Berrendo Irrigated Farms, for \$597.50, including water from a well for irrigation three years, with a guarantee of two acre feet of water during each irrigating season.

A Durand sold 40 acres of land and all the land covered by Lake Van, about two miles northwest of Dexter, to Oscar Lillybeck, for \$2500.

Roswell continues to get a little moisture day and night, and cattlemen and sheep growers are beginning to think they are going to have a good prosperous year.

Joe New, said to be only 15 years of age, has been brought back to Roswell from Clovis, charged with forging the signatures of Price & Co. and the Gross-Miller Grocery company to checks last Saturday night.

Roswell contractors who bid on the new federal building to be put up on the southeast corner of Fourth street and Richardson avenue, less than one block north of the Carnegie library, have received from Washington, D. C., a memorandum of the bids opened by the supervising architect in that city. The lowest is \$12,400 for limestone and \$114,200 for sandstone, by J. E. and N. L. Penneck, of Philadelphia; and the highest is \$153,000 for limestone, only by Cummins Bros. Co. of Lowell, Mass. The highest for sandstone is \$144,900, by Texas Building Co. of Fort Worth, who bid \$125,900 for limestone.
