**DALHART MERCHANT DIES IN EL PASO**

**Hedrick Succumbs to Long Illness—Funeral Monday Afternoon.**

Robert L. Hedrick, a well known merchant of Dalhart, Tex., died at a local hospital Sunday evening after a long illness. He had come to El Paso last Thursday for treatment. Mr. Hedrick was born at Calvert, Robertson county, Tex., 37 years ago and for many years was employed by the Fort Worth and Denver and the Rock Island railroads. He had lost his left arm in an accident and had also lost part of his right hand in another accident. Six years ago he engaged in business in Dalhart and had resided there up to the time of coming to El Paso last week. He is survived by a brother, Dr. J. A. Hedrick, of El Paso and a sister, Miss Laura Hedrick, of Dalhart. The funeral will be held from the residence of Dr. Hedrick, 815 North Oregon street, this afternoon at 4 o'clock, Rev. Caspar S. Wright, pastor of Trinity Methodist church officiating. Interment will be made in Evergreen cemetery. Members of the order of Beavers, of which Mr. Hedrick was a member, will act as pall bearers.

**JOHN P. SMART.**

John P. Smart, manager of the New York office of The El Paso Herald, died in his home in Plainfield, N. J., Saturday. The funeral will take place Tuesday. Mr. Smart was known to many El Paso business men through his courteous attentions in New York. His standing in the advertising world was high by reason of his broad experience and absolute integrity; and those associated with him in a business way soon came to treasure his friendship and to depend unreservedly upon his word.

**THIRTEEN ASK TO JOIN U. S. ARMY**

Thirteen men applied at the United States army recruiting station in El Paso, Monday morning, for enlistment in the army. The first seven of this number that were examined passed and were accepted by the officers. Nearly all the 13 enlisted in the coast artillery service. This is the largest number that has applied for enlistment in one day since the office has been opened in El Paso.

**CITY OFFICIALS AND THE RAILROADS TO TALK VIADUCT**

The city council and representatives of the Southwestern, G. H. and Santa Fe railroads will meet in the mayor's office Friday morning for the purpose of agreeing upon the erection of viaducts at the turn on the smelter road. Mayor C. E. Kelly said this afternoon that he did not doubt the railroads would finally agree to erect the bridges as soon as the meeting decides on a few points to be brought out by the engineers.

**S. P. MAKES LOS ANGELES NEW TRAFFIC DIVISION**

Los Angeles, Cal., March 6.—Upon the departure of president R. S. Lovett and party comes the announcement that Los Angeles has been created headquarters of a new traffic division of the Southern Pacific. This will cover all lines from Mojave and from Santa Barbara to El Paso. John C. Stubbs has been appointed general freight agent and Frank E. Butturs general passenger agent. The two assume their new duties tomorrow.

**REFUSES TO SERVE ON ROOSEVELT COMMITTEE**

Houston, Tex., March 6.—Because of Col. Roosevelt's attitude toward Jefferson Davis, Judge Norman C. Kittrell has declined to serve on the reception committee which will meet the former president here Sunday. Col. Jacob F. Wolters today accepted the vacant position, saying he did so owing to the restoration by Col. Roosevelt of his name on cabin John Bridge at Washington.

**FORTY CANS OF OPIUM FOUND IN PHOENIX RAID**

Werd has been received at the custom offices in El Paso that opium raids were made in Phoenix, Ariz., Saturday. Five places were raided and 40 cans of opium secured. The local customs officials made a series of raids on different houses in the southern part of the city Saturday afternoon in search of opium. No opium was found in any of the places.

**DISCHARGES A CHIEF CLERK FROM SERVICE**

Washington, D. C., March 6.—Arthur M. Travers, chief clerk to the third assistant postmaster general, was dismissed from the service today by postmaster general Hitchcock, who in a statement declared that Travers had been guilty of manipulating postage stamps for his own financial benefit.

There will be a meeting of the Central Labor Union tonight, when it is understood, the matter of placing a ticket in the field for the municipal election will be taken up.

**SUIT TO RESTRAIN PROPERTY SALE**

John Carpenter and C. R. Patterson have filed suit for injunction in the 34th district court against Thomas F. Holgate, D. Montoya and H. P. Stacy to restrain them from selling property in Highland park to satisfy a judgment of \$33, which Holgate secured in justice Stacy's court. The injunction is asked pending a rehearing of the case.

**TEXAS WOMAN ASKS DIVORCE**

Mrs. Mayme Housh has filed suit for divorce against Geo. L. Housh in the 34th district court. The petitioner alleges that they were married at Houston, Texas, on December 2, 1908, and lived together until July 17, 1910, making their home at Houston and later at San Antonio.

The East El Paso drug store has reported to the police that a number of chickens were taken from there Sunday night. Providence hospital has reported the loss of a hammock from the front porch Sunday night. Miss Lila Davis, who has been dangerously ill of pneumonia at the home of J. **Million Confirmed Drunkards in U. S. One-Third of Them Die Every Year and Ranks Keep Full**

One million persons in this country are confirmed inebriates. Of this number one-third die yearly as a result of drink, yet this number is annually made up of recruits of the army of drunkards. This was the substance of a paper read by Dr. DeLaney Carter, of the New York Medical society for the study of alcohol and other narcotics. This problem, he asserted, exceeds in sociological importance anything known to modern civilization. He urged lectures, educational efforts and every legal method of restraint that can possibly check the influx of new drunkards.

**STRIKE WATER ON MESA AT 175 FEET**

**CLIFTON COURTHOUSE SQUABBLE IS SETTLED**

Move to Restrain Greenlee Supervisors in Courthouse Plans is Withdrawn. Clifton, Ariz., March 6.—An attempt to reopen the controversy over the location of the Greenlee county courthouse failed when Judge Lewis denied an injunction to restrain the Greenlee supervisors from erecting the building on what is known as "Hill's flat." The supervisors decided in favor of that location. W. F. Hagen, one of those opposed to that site, prayed for a restraining order. The opposites to the hill's flat site want the building at East Clifton. District attorney Hortos represented the county board, and attorney McFarland appeared for the petitioner. Hagen's petition was denied on the ground that he is not a taxpayer.

**MINNEAPOLIS HAS \$1,000,000 FIRE**

Minneapolis, Minn., March 6.—One of the most disastrous fires ever had here destroyed the Syndicate block on Nicollet avenue between Fifth and Sixth streets. The total loss is estimated at \$1,000,000. Twelve persons were rescued from the upper stories of the building while the flames were roaring around them. Some of these sustained slight injuries. Thirty in all were injured. Mrs. Mary Buck, proprietress of a restaurant in the Syndicate building which was destroyed by fire last night, and one of the women reported dead, is reported safe today.

**FOURTEEN GREEKS INJURED IN CLEVELAND, OHIO, FIRE**

Cleveland, O., March 6.—Fire which broke out at 12:45 o'clock this morning destroyed a three story tenement building occupied by Greeks. A dozen men saved their lives by jumping from the second and third floors into blankets held by policemen. Several others missed the blankets and were injured. Fourteen in all were injured. The cause of the fire is unknown. First reports were that three persons met death in the fire but so far the police have been unable to verify this.

**ADVERTISING MAN ARRESTED.**

L. C. Beckwith was arrested by city detectives Monday morning on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses registered against him. It is alleged that he obtained money with the understanding that he was to place an advertising sign in a local hotel and then failed to do so. He says that he has not had sufficient time to place the sign.

GASOLINE CAUSES FIRE. Fire caused by the upsetting of a gasoline can did slight damage in a room on the alley east of Stanton street, near the corner of Ninth street, at 2:35 o'clock this afternoon. The central company responded, but the flames, which damaged a bed, had been extinguished.

**ENGLAND TO PROBE MORMON ACTIVITIES**

London, England, March 6.—Home secretary Churchill today stated in the house of commons that the attention of the government had been attracted to recent allegations of Mormon activity among women in this country, and has begun an investigation. While he had no official information to support the charges that young girls had been induced to emigrate to Utah, there is no doubt, the secretary said, that the matter is causing deep concern and he proposed to investigate it exhaustively.

**RAISING MONEY FOR THE MILLS STREET POSTOFFICE SITE**

Committee Issues Statement to the Public Concerning the Proposed Site on Kansas Street Corner. The committee which is engaged in raising the fund necessary to secure for the use of the government the proposed postoffice site at the corner of Stanton and Mills streets deems it proper at this time to issue the following statement: It is known to the general public through the newspapers that the site at the corner of Mills and Stanton streets was selected by postoffice inspector Norris as the "ideal site" having in view the selection of a site centrally located and at the same time south of the railroad tracks. Inspector Norris asked whether a responsible committee would endeavor to secure this site suggested by him and the committee undertook and promised to use its best efforts to that end. The cost of the site is very great, about \$200,000, and the sum to be raised in excess of the government appropriation is about \$140,000. This committee has raised by subscription some what more than \$40,000 and yet a large percentage of the property owners and business men south of the railroad tracks have not contributed any sum whatever. Many who have been loudest in their cry that the postoffice should be located south of the railroad tracks have failed, and some have refused to contribute toward the cost of the site. This committee has no greater interest in securing this site than many other citizens. It was not selected by them and some of the committee would prefer the location that was recommended north of the tracks. But to meet the professed wish of a good many citizens that the postoffice be situated within the inner limits of the present business district, as well as to meet the suggestion of inspector Norris, this committee took the lead in the effort to secure it. They feel that they are doing their part. Are other professed advocates of a south side site going theirs? If you wish the postoffice built south of the railroad tracks we respectfully suggest that you should help to get it there. (Signed) C. M. Newman, Chairman.

**WESTERN ROADS TO CANCEL THE RATES**

Washington, D. C., March 6.—In accordance with an agreement among railways of the Western Trunk Line association, the western lines have notified the interstate commerce commission that they will cancel proposed advances in commodity rates and accept the recent ruling of the commission. Already the Chicago & Northwestern has canceled and it is expected within the next three days all the western roads will have taken a similar action.

**DUNNE GETS RECOUNT OF CHICAGO PRIMARY**

Chicago, Ill., March 6.—County Judge Owens today ordered a recount of the ballots cast at the primary last Tuesday. The order was issued at the instance of Edward F. Dunne, who on the returns was defeated for the Democratic mayoralty nomination by Carter H. Harrison. Judge Dunne charged that gross frauds were committed.

Judge Lovett says that though the decision will have a depressing effect upon the market, the railroads will soon recover from the blow and be little the worse for their experience. Stuyvesant Fish is even less alarmed than Judge Lovett, and says: "There is nothing surprising or alarming in the decision in the railroad rate case, and properly viewed, there is much that is reassuring to real owners of railroad shares holding them for investment and income."
