MEDICAL PLANTS TO BE GROWN NEAR PECOS

Stewart Takes Charge of the State Experimental Farm. Pecos, Texas, March 11.—Sam White has received a supply of more than 40 different kinds of plants for medical purposes, which he will plant on his farm for an experiment. Mr. White believes that various plants used for making different common medicines can be grown successfully on irrigated lands in the Pecos valley and he will make a very thorough test. Some of the seed Mr. White secured comes from Manchuria, India, Siam, China and southern Japan. M. C. Stewart, formerly connected with the Agricultural and Mechanical college of New Mexico, has arrived to take charge of the state irrigation experiment farm, three miles from the city. Mr. Stewart has been engaged in agricultural experimental work in irrigated districts of New Mexico for the past 15 years and is a graduate of the territorial A. & M. college. He will have full charge of the experimental station here. It has been announced here that M. L. Swinehart, formerly secretary of Pecos Commercial club, has become general manager of a large irrigation company at Grandfalls and that he will take up his duties there shortly.

TRAGEDY REPORTED NEAR HIGH BRIDGE

Del Rio, Tex., March 11.—Information has been telephoned from Comstock, in this county of a difficulty that took place about three miles from the Pecos high bridge in which a white man in the employ of J. R. Moorhead was killed. No particulars were given further than the statement that Ben Bende, a prominent ranchman, had surrendered to the sheriff and is now held in connection with the killing. FOUR INDIANS ARE SENTENCED FOR RAIDING TURQUOISE MINE Santa Fe, N. M., March 11.—Four Pueblo Indians from Cochiti have been sentenced by Judge John R. McPhe to the penitentiary for nine months each for stealing turquoise out of the mines, 14 miles south of Santa Fe controlled by Tiffany, of New York. The Indians insisted that the mine belonged to them from time immemorial, and that they had been gathering turquoise from them for many centuries, and despite repeated warnings continued to raid them on moonlight nights as they needed the turquoise in their ceremonies to which they still adhere.
