were waiting for a detachment of federals which was reported to be moving up the line of the Mexico North Western railway from Casas Grandes.

MANY ARE LEAVING STATE OF SINALOA

Fear an Outbreak in That Region—May Be a New Governor.

Nogales, Ariz., March 23.—Passengers coming up from the south report that since the insurrectos took La Colorada they are running the Torres & Prieto railroad between Torres and Cerro Colorado, owned by an English syndicate. Americans are coming out of Culiacan, all Sinaloa and Sonora to the states for safety, and before the possibility of getting out of the state by destruction of the railroads. Many say that Culiacan is looking for an attack at any time; that all the state of Sinaloa is in a stir; that a famine is threatened, as already the food supply is getting so short that the price of wheat and prices are going higher all the while. No crops are being put in, as many of the farmers went into the rebel army, abandoning their farms. Already the poor are suffering. Some Americans who were in the state of Chihuahua and witnessed some of the battles there, left for Culiacan for quiet, which some weeks ago they found, but now all is turmoil, they say, with the insurrectos in the majority.

There is a rumor that Sinaloa is to have a new governor. Diego Redo, from Mexico City, was "elected" governor two years ago over a local man, after there had been rioting and shooting at the polls on the part of federal troops, and the people have never become reconciled to the condition.

Nogales was fortified last week with all the wagons, old and new, wires, tin cans, boxes and everything else available, say eyewitnesses who have arrived from there.

REBELS ROB TWO AMERICAN CONCERNS

Appear to Be Waiting Near Torreon for Some Action—From Limantour.

Torreon, Mexico, March 21.—(By mail.) The insurrectos are apparently waiting to give Limantour a chance. His arrival in Mexico City has apparently had the effect of causing a cessation of activities and no open hostilities have been engaged in for several days.

Saturday they made a second descent upon El Cobre mine, the property of the American Smelting and Refining company, a few kilometers from Venardena, and seized a small amount of property from the company and about \$150 in cash from the branch of the Torreon Mercantile company, an American concern, at the mine.

Sunday they appeared in large numbers at Picardias, where on the previous day they served notice that they would destroy the large bridge crossing the Aguanaval at that place. The threat up to this time has not been carried out.

Sunday about 100 rebels appeared at Loma, the first station out of Torreon on the Durango branch, and seized a number of horses from the smaller ranches, and a small amount of property from the branch of the Torreon Mercantile company, an American concern, at the mine.

Sunday they appeared in large numbers at Picardias, where on the previous day they served notice that they would destroy the large bridge crossing the Aguanaval at that place. The threat up to this time has not been carried out.

CANANEA'S TROOPS SENT TO HERMOSILLO

Band of Insurrectos Are Reported in Vicinity of Cananea.

Cananea, Sonora, Mexico, March 23.—Arrangements have been made to bring the remains of the late Lieut. Col. Luis Anguiano to Cananea for interment. A local concern has sent a number of men to the place where the disastrous battle was fought to disinter the remains of the colonel and possibly two other officers and bring them to Cananea.

It seems now that there were 31 killed and a number injured, and that some of the men joined the revolutionists.

It is reported here that there are a number of insurrectos southwest of Cananea about 15 miles away, who have been in the hills for a few weeks. They have not been active, although they have been sending men to Cananea looking over conditions. One of the spies was recently arrested by the federals. These men have been living off the ranchers nearby and a number of horses have been confiscated by them.

There are not many soldiers left in this section of the state at present, possibly 250 to 300 remaining out of the 750 that have been operating in this neighborhood north to the line. The men have been sent to the neighborhood of Hermosillo.

BATTLE IS FOUGHT IN RAVISPE VALLEY

Douglas, Ariz., March 23.—Americans arriving here report that "Red" Lopez and his rebels fought at Chiapa, in Ravispe valley, with the federals on Monday.

"Red" Lopez and his band of 180 rebels are now on the Cuchiveri road, four miles east of Douglas. Other forces said to total several hundred men have suddenly appeared to the east. The information in regard to these is that they are operating independently in several bands, each having leaders.

Lopez is not heading for Agua Prieta, but is said to be going south for horses.

HANDCAR RUNS INTO BURNED-OUT BRIDGE

American Meet With Accident in Coming From Casas Grandes.

A crew of bridge carpenters, accompanied by Lester Haymore, a merchant of Colonia Dublin, were wrecked on a handcar near San Pedro on the Mexico North Western line Saturday night. John Sanderson of the crew has arrived in El Paso for medical treatment with the report of the accident. The crew, including Sanderson, Bob Melone, Henry Howard, Bill Mimce, Charles Wessen and Lester Haymore, left Pearson Friday night and were traveling on a handcar with a push car in front with their baggage and tools on it. A fall had been rigged up on the push car to aid it along with the wind and the men were pumping the handcar.

When the San Pedro bridge was reached the men failed to see that it had been blown out by Creighton's band of dynamiters. The handcar and push car both plunged off the embankment and the men were thrown a distance of 12 feet. Four of the men jumped and received no more serious injury than a number of scratches and bruises. Sanderson's right leg was broken at the high ankle. Howard was rendered unconscious. Sanderson's head was cut and his face was badly bruised by the fall. Howard and Mimce were taken to the hospital of a mining company at San Pedro and Sanderson came to El Paso.

BULLETS AT OJINAGA FALL AMONG UNITED STATES TROOPS

Marfa, Tex., March 23.—Shortly after the crossing of supplies from Presidio intended for the Mexican troops besieged in Ojinaga, directly across the Rio Grande, had been stopped yesterday, bullets from federal rifles fell among a detachment of United States troops guarding the American side of the river. An explanation has been demanded of Col. Luque, in command of the Mexican troops.

A report of the firing into the troops is being sent to Lieut. J. E. Taylor for transmission to Washington. The orders to prevent the crossing of supplies came from United States customs officials.

The ninth day of the siege shows the insurrectos' lines surrounding the city unbroken.

Reports from Ojinaga are that supplies are running low and, besides the garrison of 500 soldiers, 1000 non-combatants are suffering for want of food.

Several persons have been wounded by bullets which crossed the river. The latest victim, a Mexican youth, was shot through the thigh while watching a clash between the soldiers and the revolutionists from the American side.

MEXICAN REFUGEES SUFFER TERRIBLY ON CALIFORNIA LINE

Teacote, L. C., March 23.—Lieut. Plisk, U. S. A., receiving orders to investigate the condition of Mexican refugees on the American side of the line and to report on their number and condition, reported the presence on the hill sides of 173 men, women and children without adequate clothing, shelter and food. Of the large number of children among them all are thinly clad in calico and other cotton stuffs. Most of the women and children are barefoot.

They are encamped under trees and wagons and some have large pieces of cloth for shelter tents. In the only house are 30 women and children who have subsisted on crackers bought from an American store.

GOES TO FABENS FOR INSURRECTO

Man Supposed to Be Cano Held There for U. S. Officers.

Deputy United States marshal Rogers left today for Fabens to take charge of an insurrecto who is supposed to be Gabino Cano, who was arrested in El Paso some time ago charged with violation of the neutrality law and who is at present out on bond.

Cano was arrested at Fabens Wednesday. The Mexican government has filed a complaint against Cano and asked for his extradition. He will be brought to El Paso this afternoon.

GARZA DOESN'T KNOW CREIGHTON

General Gonzalez Garza, secretary general of the insurrecto party, denies having made statements in praise of Oscar G. Creighton as attributed to him. He says: "I do not know Creighton and I do not know if he has been deposed or not. I did not say that he could not be deposed and that he was working under the direct orders of Col. Soto. I know nothing of him. I have never given him any orders and have never met him."

LOWER CALIFORNIA REVOLT IS ENTIRELY SEPARATE AFFAIR

Mexicali, Mex., March 23.—The presence here of Francisco Salinas, who has a reputation as a trained and tried military man, has greatly increased the confidence of the rebels.

It is evident that Salinas considers the insurrecto movement in Lower California as independent of that in the states of Sonora and Chihuahua. He said today that if Lower California rebels, this would mean that in case Diaz and Madero should agree to peace terms, that separate negotiations would have to be entered with the peninsula insurrectos.
