WITH HEAVY IMPOST MEADOW WINS HANDICAP

Carries 145 Pounds and Runs a Remarkable Race to Victory.

Meadow, loaded to the guards with lead, won the Chihuahua handicap Sunday under conditions truly remarkable.

The remarkable performance of Meadow in this event was over the long route of one and one-eighth miles, a distance that is most trying under ordinary impost conditions.
