WORKING MANY ON ROAD NEAR BERINO

Berino, N. M., April 4.—Work on the Anthony-Dona Ana road is progressing with gratifying rapidity. The road is cleared and grubbed from the state line to quite a distance north of Vado, and two miles are graded on both sides of Berino, and a large force of teams and men are at work rushing the early completion of the heaviest parts, that is from Anthony to Mesquite. From the latter place to Las Cruces the road was cleared several years ago. It is hoped to have the road open and as much of it surfaced as possible this month, because it will be impossible to secure teams as soon as the alfalfa crop is ready, and that is not so far off, though not so close as some of the enterprising correspondents would have us believe.

J. H. Sewall has finished drilling a well for Price & Richardson, and is now putting up the windmill and tank. The well is the deepest one so far drilled in this part of the valley, being 166 feet to the bottom of the strainer, and a heavy flow of soft water is now being pumped to the surface. The well is in connection with this well is the fact that the vein of water rises three feet above the surface water level, giving strong evidence of an artesian well.

F. G. Belk and wife left for Houston last week to attend the wedding of the former's sister, Miss Edaline, to Mr. Scott, of that city, and have not yet returned, though the bride and groom are now here at the Belk home, spending their honeymoon.

This part of the valley was visited Sunday by a terrific gale of wind, followed by a sharp shower. The Organ mountains were white with snow after the clouds cleared away.

F. E. Summers, superintendent of the A. T. & S. P., stopped at Berino the past week and made glad the people by promising the installing of a platform and a waiting room as soon as possible. He also made arrangements to raise the siding so that an easy crossing may be put in.

The Modern Woodmen gave a masked ball and money experience difficulty in reaching the ballroom. While the occasion was enjoyed, the troubles on the way ranged from mud holes, broken harness, bogged teams and broken wagon tongues to high and lofty tumbling over barbed wire fences. The Chamberino schoolhouse was the gathering point and it was supposed to be an April fool dance, so that it would seem no one should complain.

The establishment of a 50 mile automobile speedway is being discussed to run east of the Prallis range, north from El Paso to the Earham pass, thence back down the valley on the new roads. The route is entirely feasible, except for about two miles, which the expenditure of \$1000 would remedy.

C. Coldwell, who has had the Gallagher farm at Vado leased, has turned that place over to Mr. Stamper, and taken a large wheat field at La Union on shares.

LAS CRUCES MINOR HAPPENINGS.

Las Cruces, N. M., April 4.—C. E. Jameson of El Paso has taken a position with the Las Cruces Drug company.

During the wind storm of Sunday afternoon the new plate glass windows in the May building were in great danger, the suction causing them to spring from four to six inches out of the perpendicular. Men were employed to hold them steady during the worst part of the storm.

COUNTY OFFICIALS TO GET PAY RAISE

Dona Ana Is Made a "Class A" County by the Auditor.

Las Cruces, N. M., April 4.—The board of commissioners of Dona Ana county has received from C. V. Safford, traveling auditor of the territory, a statement making Dona Ana county a county of class A. This classification will make an increase in the salaries of the county commissioners, the probate judge and probate clerk.

Upon certificate by C. V. Safford, dated February 3, 1911, this county is declared a county of Class C for the purpose of fixing the salaries of district attorneys for the year 1911.

Upon certificate of James E. Clark, superintendent of public instruction, the salary of the county school superintendent is fixed at \$1200 per year in accordance with the session laws of 1907.

The board of horticulture has been authorized to employ a field inspector to oversee the proper spraying of all orchards within Dona Ana county, the salary being fixed at \$75 per month. Prof. Fabian Garcia, head of the horticultural department of the Agricultural college, will have this matter under his direct supervision and will recommend the man to fill the place of inspector. All trees will have to be sprayed at least twice each year and if this is not done the inspector will have the power to destroy the fruit before it matures.

WIND DOES DAMAGE AROUND LAS CRUCES

Las Cruces, N. M., April 4.—Las Cruces was visited by one of the worst wind and dust storms ever experienced in the past six years on Sunday afternoon, the wind reaching a velocity of 55 miles an hour. Considerable damage was done by the wind, the roof being blown off the Lohman property on Main street occupied by N. C. Flint, and also damaging the house on the W. C. Field ranch and the residence of I. R. Holt in this city, besides blowing down a large number of trees.

During a heavy hail storm in the San Andres mountains, W. A. Surberland of this city lost a number of kids and goats from his flock of Angoras. Other goat and sheep men of this section report heavy losses from this storm. In neither storm, however, was the hail heavy enough to damage the fruit.

Mr. Sedler, superintendent of the temperance league in New Mexico, in the Presbyterian church at Mesilla Park spoke about the liquor traffic, especially dealing with New Mexico, in which prohibition, he said, is gaining very rapidly.

TEACHING THE PUPILS HOW TO WRITE LETTERS

Las Cruces, N. M., April 4.—Prof. J. H. Wagner, superintendent of the Las Cruces public schools, has entered into an arrangement with other superintendents by which the pupils of each school are to write letters of interest as pertaining to their own locality. These letters to be exchanged between the different schools, the aim being to assist in a practical manner the teaching of the school children to write sensible letters and to pick out the interesting facts to be included in interesting to the other people. The schools of Atlanta, Ga., and Egg Harbor, N. J., have already complied with the agreement and letters have been exchanged between them and the Las Cruces school. The pupils of the 7th, 8th and 9th grades here are conducting the correspondence, which promises to be of intensely interesting and instructive benefit to all.
