OLD MCGINTY MAY BE AT OJINAGA

Two Cannon Taken to Aid of the Insurrectos Besieging the Town.

Presidio, Tex., April 11.—Two hundred recruits have arrived and joined Gen. Sanchez's force to assist in the siege of Ojinaga. They brought with them two cannons. The cannons are of an old type, but will undoubtedly be very effective in an attempt to take the town. One is said to be the McGinty cannon from El Paso.

Several brisk skirmishes have taken place between the federals and the pronunciamientos, who are besieging the town, but both hold practically the same positions that they have been holding since the siege began. A detachment of Gen. Sanchez's men at one time drove in the federal outposts and took up a position which commanded the crossing recently opened between the town and this side of the river, but after a heavy fire from the federal guns, during which probably 10,000 shots were exchanged, the besiegers were forced back into their old trenches. The crossing is still in shooting distance of the besiegers, but is protected by a thick growth of trees and brush, which cuts off the view from the besiegers and makes the crossing very difficult.

Four hundred federals were expected to arrive yesterday. It is said they were to come from Santa Rosalia. If this report is true, a fight will in all probability, take place as soon as the federals arrive. An effort will undoubtedly be made to prevent the federal reinforcements from getting into the town. A fight is daily expected to take place between the two forces. The town is said to be well fortified, and situated as it is on high ground, would, it appears, make an attack on it very difficult, and in all probability, exceedingly disastrous to the attacking party.

MEXICAN FEDERALS PRESSING NO ADVANTAGE AT MEXICALI
 Mexicali, Mex., April 11.—Col. Miguel Mayot and approximately 600 federal troops are still encamped five miles south of here and are as inactive as if there were no rebels anywhere in Lower California. In the trenches here there are 100 rebels, mostly Americans, contemptuous of the progress of the so-called "fighting 8th battalion" of the federal army, and eager to try conclusions with their foes. Mayot's army has been augmented by reinforcements.

The inactivity of the Mexican federals is inexplicable. After having flanked and practically surrounded Williams's small force of 55 men Saturday, they failed to pursue the retreating force and Monday Mayot gave the surprising information that he did not follow his advantage because he had orders to attack Mexicali and would not do so until he received instructions. "We were ordered here to protect the American dam on the Colorado river," he said, "and we will go there unless otherwise instructed."

RELATED CLOSELY TO THREE GOVERNORS

A Woman Dies in El Paso Who Was From Notable Missouri Family.

Mrs. Lavinia M. Bruce, wife of W. R. Bruce, died at the family residence, 1804 Montana street, Monday morning, after a protracted illness. She was 73 years of age. Born in Saline county, Missouri, December 15, 1837, she was the daughter of M. M. Marmaduke, governor of Missouri in 1844; sister of Gen. John S. Marmaduke, who was governor of Missouri in 1854; niece of Claiborne T. Jackson, who was governor of the same state in 1850. She is survived by her husband and one son, Lollo. Her body will be taken to Decatur, Tex., for interment, which will take place Thursday.

CURRY HEADS BIG IRRIGATION MOVE

Santa Fe, N. M., April 11.—Territorial engineer Charles D. Miller has approved the following water rights applications: Ex-governor George Curry of Tulareo, Otero county, for 17 second feet of the Rio Rinconada to store 10,000 acre feet to reclaim 15,000 acres, at a cost of \$300,000; W. Goff Black and Arthur Ponsford of Aztec, 50 second feet from the San Juan river to reclaim 10,000 acres and for power purposes, the project to cost \$50,000, and to John du Beau of Fruitland, waters of arroyos and the Meadows storage system. The application of the Springer Land and Irrigation company in Colfax county for an extension of time was rejected, as was the application of Lucas Gallegos of Vallecitos for the waters of the Cebolleta in Rio Arriba county. A check for \$1000 was received from the Santa Fe Railway company to aid in the work of stream measurement and a contribution for that purpose of \$150 from the Farmers' Development company was received.

WITNESS IN JAIL FOR NOT APPEARING

Juan Rodriguez is in the county jail because he failed to answer a summons to appear as a witness in the case of Pedro Alvarez, charged with theft, when the case was called in the 34th district court Monday afternoon. He was arrested Tuesday morning and placed in the county jail in default of \$100 bond. Rodriguez, who has been here but six months and conducts the Lone Star saloon, said he could not leave his place of business. The case had to be continued because he was not on hand.

FIREMEN STONED BY STREET MOBS

Eight Alarms Are Turned in And Only One Is Genuine.

Eight fire alarms were turned in between 10:30 Monday night and 8 o'clock Tuesday morning, and only one of them proved to be a fire. That was shortly after 11 o'clock and entailed the destruction of a shed in East El Paso near the brewery. Other alarms were turned in from San Francisco and Leon streets. En route home the firemen were stoned and W. E. Smith was struck in the face, but not badly injured. Another alarm was turned in from the corner of West Overland and Santa Fe streets and while en route some fireman J. E. Gorman was struck in the side with a stone, thrown by some one of the crowd gathered on the streets. Another alarm was turned in from this same corner later and the other alarms were turned in from Overland and Overland, Myrtle avenue and Campbell street, San Antonio and Florence and Florence and Fifth.

CANANEA MAN HAS BUILT AN AIRSHIP

Cananea, Sonora, Mexico, April 11.—Dan Lewis, who has been working on an aeroplane for the past 18 months, has completed the machine and has given it an initial tryout. The machine works perfectly on the ground and just as it was to be tried in the air two guy wires broke. The machine was taken back to the hangar where it awaits the arrival of stronger wire. Lewis expects to have the machine in the air next week. A special train bearing the officials of the S. P. de M. railroad was in Cananea for a few hours. The party included manager R. H. Ingram, Supt. H. J. Temple, Asst. Supts. Patterson and Kuck, and R. B. M. Wilson, the new superintendent of maintenance of way.

NEW MANAGER FOR WESTERN UNION

Supt. Norman Ringer of the Western Union, who came over from Dallas, has just completed the task of checking in R. D. Gould as manager of the El Paso office, vice H. L. Burrows. Mr. Gould came from Mr. Ringer's office at Dallas, where he was district commercial agent. Mr. Burrows will go to Dallas with Mr. Ringer and will be assigned to service there. He is leaving El Paso on account of the effect of the altitude upon his health.

FIFTEEN DROWN ON A SINKING STEAMER

Victoria, B. C., April 11.—It is known positively today that at least 15 persons perished when the steamer Ironquols turned turtle yesterday. How many more drowned may never be known for the pursuer who had the list of passengers is among the dead.

 "The government is now getting in control of the situation in Chihuahua," the grandson of the great Mexican landowner said. "The insurrectos cannot win for they have not the means nor the men. Gen. Terrazas has lost heavily because of the trouble. Just how much it will be impossible to say until the reports of all the ranches are received. There is no immediate possibility of his estate being divided, I believe."
 The Terrazas party will leave on the Golden State limited for Los Angeles.
HIG GUNS OFFERED TO SMUGGLE IN AMMUNITION
 New Orleans, La., April 11.—Twenty thousand dollars will be paid for the delivery in Mexico at a point between El Paso and Chihuahua, of a consignment of \$70,000 worth of ammunition for the Mexican revolutionists. A New Orleans business man has been appealed to by a member of the revolutionary junta to devise some way of guaranteeing the delivery of the big shipment of ammunition which is said to be waiting on railroad sidetracks in Pennsylvania.
 Men experienced in the revolutionary game in New Orleans have never had serious trouble in getting guns and ammunition to Central American countries by steamer, but they are without experience in overland shipments and the agent of the junta was unable to make satisfactory arrangements for the movement of the ammunition.

TRYING TO BURN RAILWAY BRIDGES

Heavy Guard Over a Long Bridge of National Road Near Saltillo.

Monterrey, Mexico, April 11.—Word has reached here from San Luis Potosi to the effect that several attempts have been made recently by the rebels to burn the bridges between that city and Saltillo, on the Mexican National railroad. It is said that most of the bridges in that section are very small and should they be totally ruined it would not delay traffic more than a few hours. The longest bridge is near Saltillo and is being guarded by 100 men. The ravages practiced so far have for the most part been between the stations of Gomez Farias and Carneros. It is said that if the big bridge goes down, traffic between Monterrey and Mexico City over the national road will be shut off for eight days or more. It is also reported from San Luis Potosi that trains arriving there are covered with signs which have evidently been placed on the cars by the rebels. It is thought from this that the railroad men favor the rebels in that section.

ZACATECAS ATTACK OF REBELS REPULSED

Zacatecas, Mex., April 11.—Luis Moya's attempt to capture Zacatecas failed. Pleading northward he and his band of 400 revolutionists were pursued by a small detachment of federals, under command of Lieut. Col. Luis C. Pradillo. Forty dead and wounded rebels were left in the streets of the city.
 In making their attack Sunday, 100 of Moya's men were sent down the sides of the hills into the city. Through street after street they ran shooting as they went, but inflicting few injuries. One man shot at governor Sarate, who was going from post to post among the federals and among the residents of the town warning them to refrain from panic.
 While the attack on Zacatecas was in progress another attack by a much smaller band was made on San Miguel del Mesquite, near here. The assailants were repulsed with loss of nine killed. The dead included Anastasio Valnuro, the rebel leader.

TEN MACHINE GUNS CACHED NEAR HACITA

Ten more machine guns are reported to be cached near Hacita, N. M., to be taken across the border into Chihuahua by the insurrectos for the use of the artillery division of the Madero army. These machine guns are thought to be a part of the shipment which was received billed to the American Mining company, a fictitious company, and taken across the line last week.

REBELS DEFEATED IN A FIGHT NEAR C. P. DIAZ

Eagle Pass, Tex., April 11.—Rebels under Ernesto Guajardo attacked Palau, on the Mesquite branch of the Mexican International yesterday, according to a report received in Ciudad Porfirio Diaz across the river from here. The rebels were driven off with one man killed, it is said. A company of volunteers was dispatched to the relief of Palau.

STRAIGHT TALK ABOUT ELECTION

Monterrey Editor Declares That Things Must Not Go on as in Past.

Monterrey, Mexico, April 11.—Today's "El Trueno," a newspaper published in Spanish, by Martin Stecker, publishes the following in regard to the election for governor, which is due soon: "Today or tomorrow there should be issued a candidature for deputies and, perhaps, also for governor of the state, as the time is near when the election should come off. In public nothing has been said about this election, and if what is told us is true, it is thought that it will proceed this time the same as before. The system of naming candidates without consulting in the least the principal social elements, united with the 'making' of the election, has been disastrous in the past, as it has furnished a place for no less a thing than the revolution. "Today it is necessary to count on a considerable number of persons to make good a candidacy, and the citizens are not disposed as formerly to sign that about which they have not been consulted. Those elements which before were noticeably absent from politics, today are felt strongly and they are able to make themselves respected, being sure that there will be no political persecutions."
 El Trueno is the only paper in this section which has treated on this subject in this manner, and having been in jail already several times for mixing in politics in this country, the editor is evidently confident this time that he knows what he is talking about.

BANDITS RAID JALISCO TOWNS

Men From Tepic Invade Jalisco and Kill a Number of People.

Guadalajara, Mexico, April 11.—According to advices received here, bandits from the territory of Tepic have raided Palos Verdes, a small town in the Mascota district of Jalisco, killing the local judge, Jose Montes de Oca, and 10 other residents. The bandits secured some money and extensive supplies of corn and beans. It is reported that the band is still in the Mascota district. A detachment of state gendarmes has been sent in pursuit.

SIXTY SOLDIERS PASS THROUGH CITY

Are En Route to San Antonio From Hacita, New Mexico.

Sixty soldiers of Company I, of the United States signal corps, passed through El Paso on a special troop train on route to San Antonio, from Hacita, N. M., about 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The company will join the troops now stationed at San Antonio. The train was made up of 14 cars, two tourist cars in which the soldiers traveled, six stock cars, four flat cars, one baggage car and one freight car.
