RELEASE OF BOYS WAS A DIAZ BLUFF

Called by State Department, Mexico Government Hastened Much.

President Diaz's supposed coup in which he slipped one over on the state department and in the law was the equivalent of another kidnapping.

All of which shows that president Diaz not only did not double cross secretary Knox and the state department, but was caught holding a four fish in his own hand.

What the crafty old president was trying to do was to get the boys off of his hands without being forced to deliver them to the United States upon the request of the state department.

According to his opinion, the government called the bluff of the three boys and for once in their lives the Mexican officials, from minister de la Barra to the jail trustee, got a hump on themselves in double quick time and freed the boys before a situation, already critical, became more acute.

WAR WORKS MANY WONDERS; IT DOES

War works wonderful ways. Brother fought brother in the civil war of the United States of America, and here in an instance where pupil fights master in the revolution of the United States of Mexico.

Some years ago Col. Tambores was master of fortifications in the national military school at Mexico City. He is now in permanent command at Cloudcroft. It was Col. Tambores' dad Juarez who was a member of the original board of strategy. He was in the battle of Casas Grandes, but became so disgusted with the form of attack that he retired from the service. But since he has joined the rebel army again, retaining his commission, he is now in the front.

So if Juarez were attacked, or will be attacked by any chance, on one side is the master, who fortifies the town, and on the other the pupil, who will have an opportunity to show the fault or perfection in the master's work.

"RED" LOPEZ, OF AGUA PRIETA FAME, IS HERE

"Red" Lopez, the hero and the Nero of Agua Prieta, is in El Paso, but where—just now—nobody knows. Lopez presents himself to a crowd of his countrymen, and then disappears up an alley, or through the swinging doors of a saloon. Lopez, who led the rebels who captured Agua Prieta, and then surrendered to Gen. Boone in Douglas, is not in El Paso to attend the peace conference. It is given out that he has severed his connection with the revolutionary party.
