This is his first visit here since the offices have been moved into the new office building on the hill, from the house tents on the flat. The tents have the past week been used as club rooms. The Office of the Royal Elephant held its late meeting there. The Victrola has been moved into one of these tents and concerts are being given frequently and are greatly enjoyed.

Rapid progress is now being made on the cottages. A large force of men is employed on the different lines of work in connection with the erection of these cottages and from present indications it will be but a short time before they are completed. The house tents are already getting pretty warm.

IN SIX MINUTES NEW YORK HAD LINE INTO DOUGLAS, ARIZ. Then, Over 3845 Miles of Wire, the Associated Press Talked to Its Correspondent About the Battle.

For more than an hour the other day New York was in as close touch with the fighting Mexicans across the border from Douglas, Ariz., as rent files. The circuit reached all the way from this city to Los Angeles and thence looping around to the southeast into the Arizona border town.

Just a few minutes after 10 o'clock Thursday morning the "A. P." desired to speak direct to its correspondent at Douglas, Aloysius Coll. Dispatches had contained alleged extracts from a report of minister de la Barra to Diaz. The Associated Press desired to find out from its correspondent what there was in them—and it desired to find out in a hurry.

At 10:25 a. m. the manager of the local office asked the Western Union for a direct wire to Douglas. At 10:34 word came to call Douglas on loop No. 7. The operator sat down at the instrument on loop No. 7 and signaled

While he was finishing his dispatch, the local office was mimeographing the first page of it and sending it out to all the newspaper offices in Manhattan.
