OROZCO TO GO SOUTH WITH HIS FORCE TO MEET RABAGO

MADERO ISSUES STATEMENT ON THE FALL OF JUAREZ; OROZCO TALKS

Both Are Pleased With Result—Madero Says Soldier Prisoners Will Be Permitted to Join His Army—He May Trade Navarro for Hay—Moses and St. Peter Victims of Bullets.

Having taken Juarez, the insurrectos propose to hold it, and to do this the leaders have decided to adopt tactics well recognized in warfare as best for preventing the recapture of a city once taken.

It is recognized by the insurrecto chiefs that the only way in which Juarez or any other city can be held is by preventing the opposing forces from getting to it, and to do this it will be necessary to do the really defending away from the city by going out to meet the enemy.

Francisco I. Madero, Jr., gave out the following statement at 6 o'clock Wednesday evening: "The taking of Juarez is of great military and political importance for the revolution and assures our complete triumph in a short time."

Gen. Pascual Orozco, the hero of Juarez, and the military commander of the insurrecto forces in northern Mexico, said to Herald reporter late this afternoon: "I was sure of taking Juarez in the first place, we had the best men, and although we had few more than the federals, the quality more than made up for it."

Gen. Navarro may be traded for Hay—For Eduardo Hay, one of the insurrecto board of strategy, now a prisoner in the state penitentiary at Chihuahua, Francisco I. Madero, when he reached Juarez yesterday afternoon, after the surrender, said so.

The old Cathedral in the center of Juarez is pecked full of holes from insurrecto bullets, but very little damage has been done to the old building. Moses had his sword cut in two and St. Peter had a chip taken out of his key.

The postoffice, that formed the headquarters of Benito Juarez when he was rallying his command to repulse Maximilian, is a complete wreck from fire, started by insurrecto bombs, and the bronze bust of the Mexican patriot lies twisted and warped in the embers inside the skeleton walls.

Insurrectos have taken the big rural hats as trophies of war and are wearing them in place of their own battered headgear. SOLDIERS DISCARD UNIFORMS.

None of the federal soldiers are wearing their uniforms, and the street leading to the curiel is literally covered with uniforms and coats which were discarded by the soldiers prior to the fall of the curiel.

Commerce street, looking towards Navarro's former headquarters, is in good condition. Many of the stores have been opened and the curio shops in the block on Comercio street, where the car turns, are undamaged and have not even been opened.

Mayor Kelly crossed the river Wednesday afternoon and paid a visit to Francisco I. Madero. The rebel chieftain asked him not to allow anybody from El Paso to come to Juarez except on urgent business, until Thursday afternoon after 3 o'clock.

To show their contempt for the federal uniforms, the insurrectos piled up all they found in the barracks when they captured the place today, and made a bonfire of them in the street. Small boys appropriated some of the caps, after removing the brass regimental numbers from the fronts, and are marching about the streets as proud as commanders of an army.

So far there is almost perfect order and a minimum of drunkenness. Guards watch the doors of all saloons, and the anti-liquor law is in complete force. Ciudad Juarez is destined to be the first prohibition town in Mexico.

Gov. Gonzalez, of Chihuahua, who also acts as chief of the military zone of which this is a part, says positively that Gen. Navarro is held as a prisoner of war, and will have all courtesies required by military customs.

Dr. Andrew von Matthesius, a German physician of Ciudad Juarez, was active on the field, visiting the wounded in the many places where they are confined.

Insurrectos are guarding every store in the city, which is not securely locked and barred. They sit in front of the stores in chairs, and allow no one but the proprietor to enter. This same system is being carried out in the saloons.
