SOUTHERN ARIZONA TAKES TO WRESTLING

Ketchel and Hussen Scheduled for Return Match. Dorris to Meet Rivers.

Bisbee, Ariz., July 21.—Southern Arizona has gone wrestling mad. The match at Tombstone on July 15, when Al Ketchel, a Bisbee aspirant for welter weight championship honors, met Ed Hussen, the present holder of the title, settled nothing, as the match was declared a draw and only served to fan the ardor of the fans. Ketchel has challenged the title holder for a return match here on the evening of July 29. After the match at Tombstone it was agreed to wrestle again for the title on Labor day, but Ketchel is anxious to test and hold the belt and has forwarded a challenge to Hussen for a match here on the 29th. So far as known, the Tombstone match holds the record for time without a fall. The time of the match was three hours and 22 minutes. The betting was at even money at the first encounter and several thousand dollars were placed on the result but this was taken down when the match was declared a draw. While the match was a draw, Bisbee backers of Ketchel will go stronger in the betting than in the first match, as several circumstances favor Ketchel in comparison of the two mat men. Hussen is forced to ask for a rest during the match and it was Hussen who, asked that the match be declared a draw, to which Ketchel agreed on a satisfactory money settlement. There is no doubt as to Hussen's right to the title as he has never been thrown. He weighed in at 151 on July 15, and Ketchel at 150.

Bisbee fans will witness another championship match July 31 when Joe Dorris, light weight champion of Arizona, will meet Raymond Rivers, of Tucson here. Dorris is a brother of the El Paso wrestler who recently held to the title of special weight champion of Texas at the El Paso tournament. Rivers is a brother of the Los Angeles pugilist who has been climbing the rungs of that game in a sensational manner.

Dorris also has a match on with trooper Muff of troop I, Sixth cavalry, of Fort Huachuca, in Bisbee Saturday night.

Chester Grow, who has been thrown by both Ketchel and Saunders, Bisbee wrestlers, will wrestle trooper Titus, of troop M at Fort Huachuca in the next 10 days. They wrestled a preliminary to the Hussen-Ketchel match without a fall.

FOUR FAVORITES FIRST UNDER WIRE AT BUTTE MEET

Butte, Mont., July 21.—Four favorites were first under the wire at the races of the Butte Jockey club. Myles O'Connell's victory in the fourth race when he won by a length and a half over Coppertown was yesterday's feature. He made the futurity course in 1:09 4-5, the same time as made by Work Box when the track record was broken. Coppertown ran a magnificent race, coming from far behind and cutting down the lead of O'Connell by a dash that aroused the grandstand to cheers. The sixth resulted in eye-lash finish between Gemmill and Muff, the judges awarding it to Gemmill. The crowd surrounded the judges' stand shouting and demanding that Muff be given it.

CHANCE WILL NOT DON THE UNIFORM OF PLAYER AGAIN

Chicago, Ill., July 21.—According to president Charles W. Murphy, of the Cubs, Frank I. Chance, manager of the team, will never don a uniform again unless he does so in order to go on the coaching line.

Murphy said yesterday that Victor Sater would be seen at first base and that Chance would do the dictating from the bench.

Chance has been struck on the head nearly 40 times since he took up the game and it is said the last blow caused his retirement as a player manager.

The Greatest Play

As Told To Hugh S. Fullerton

By MIKE MITCHELL. **That I Ever Saw**

Premier Outfielder and Base Runner of the Cincinnati Reds, and Who Is One of the Greatest Batters in the Business.

I believe Dode Paskert made the greatest play I ever saw in my life, and it was a play that impressed me wonderfully. The play was a living testimonial to the honesty of baseball and of baseball players. It was made in a game in Cincinnati late in the fall of 1908 against the Chicago Cubs and came near robbing Chance's team of the pennant.

Pittsburg to beat the Giants out. He declared that if it came down to him to win a game for Cincinnati against the Cubs he wouldn't win it. You know a fellow can get mad and say things like that, which he doesn't mean. There never was a chance that Paskert would lose a game purposely, but he and several others of us were sore enough to want to do it just at that time.

I think it was the eighth inning of that game. Paskert was pulling as hard as he could for Chicago to beat us. They had us beat, as a matter of fact, but in that eighth inning they had two men on bases and two out when Hofman hit the ball a mile to center field. It looked a three-base hit, perhaps a home run. Paskert didn't seem to have a chance to catch it. You know on the Cincinnati park

a few days before we had been playing the New York Giants. The Giants were fighting and using every means in their power to beat Chicago out of the pennant. They came to our town, and the way they went after Paskert angered him. They said things to him that hurt, and he was bitter. He had it in for the whole New York crowd, especially McGraw, and wanted revenge. He wanted the Cubs or
