HOW WOULD YOU MAKE A MINT JULEP?

Only One of Three National Judges Gives a Prescription.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 12.—Representative Ollie James, of Kentucky, and Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, government pure food expert, who with Henry Watterson, of Louisville, were named as a committee to settle an alleged \$2000 bet as to the merits of a mint julep, had interviews today touching that famous beverage.

The utterance of Mr. James, popularly supposed because of his place of residence to be ex-cathartes, set forth that a mint julep should be mixed in a silver cup, a lump of sugar in the bottom, with a leaf or two of mint. Next comes cracked ice filling the cup to the brim. The ice must be stirred as it is put in, thus crushing the mint a bit and putting a fine frost on the outside of the cup, an ornamental feature highly regarded. The stirring must be done with a silver spoon if the true Kentucky ideal is to be gained. Then the whiskey is poured in and the wonder is complete.

It happens that in Dr. Wiley, a freetotaler, was secured as a judge. Dr. Wiley said if he were called on to produce a mint julep he would procure some mint, look up some Washington bartender and ask him to make the julep.

In the evening a game of tennis was played and later when the shades of evening had fallen on the tennis court, a bonfire was built near the court and athletic sports were indulged in. About 9:30 the tennis club repaired to the mess hall where the banquet was held. Tables for the opposing teams were set on opposite sides of the hall.

The camp residents are experiencing another ice famine. Owing to the extreme hot weather this is regarded as quite a hardship. Several carloads of young cattle were unloaded at Cutter, Tuesday, having been brought in by the north-bound passenger train. The cattle are brought there for the purpose of fattening them up on the grassy plains of the surrounding country. The new cottage for labor superintendent Schumannhausen will be completed this week. At the present time he and his family are living in a house tent on the flat. The corral at the townsite has been painted red. Steady progress is being made day and night on the excavation for the flume. The fifth derrick has lately been put in operation. Messrs. Clark and Nelpert have about recovered from burns received while regulating the acetylene used for lighting up the river valley for the night work in the vicinity of the dam. Work has been started on the construction of the machine shops in the vicinity of the lumber yards. Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Bailey have returned from an overland trip to Tularosa. Mrs. Bailey suffered an accident by being thrown from the buggy in the vicinity of Cutter. They were driving at night when their horse fright-

ened and ran into a wire fence and was severely cut about the head. Rev. W. C. Buell spent the past week at his home at Mesilla Park, but will return in time to hold church at the tent at the townsite Sunday evening at 7:30. The new organ recently purchased by the congregation is to be quite an addition to the church services. W. M. Reed, district engineer, has been in El Paso for a few days. The tennis score between the Tarantulas and Scorpions in the present tournament stands 6 to 4 in favor of the former. The terminal yards are being ballasted by means of crushed rock shipped in by the railroad company. A thousand cubic yards have been purchased. The Women's Aid society held a meeting at the home of Mrs. Daniel Taylor Thursday afternoon. Miss May Adair has returned to her home in Las Cruces after a month's visit here and at Los Polomas hot springs, near here. C. D. Wells, of Pueblo, Colo., is expected here on Tuesday for a visit with his son, W. M. Wells. Considerable progress has been made on the foundation for the power house. The new mess hall at the townsite will soon be ready for use. The new frame postoffice building at the townsite is practically completed. If present plans are carried out, the mercantile store at the upper camp will be moved to the new building at the townsite the first of next week. The office men's dormitory is now receiving the exterior coat of cement. Thursday was pay day at the reclamation office. The young son of Mr. Lambert at the townsite, who was severely hurt by being thrown from a horse over a steep embankment, suffering a severe

cut on the head besides being severely bruised, is recovering. George Hall, who for some time has been employed here, has resigned and will spend some time this summer traveling and selling stereopticon views.
