WAIL OF WOE FROM SOLDIER BOYS IN CAMP

The Long Hike, the Heat, the Hunger and the Fatigue All Real

Camp Mabry, Austin, Tex., Aug. 14.—Co. K arrived all right at Taylor at 6 a. m. It was hot as blazes and there was confusion in every department. Finally at 11:30 the boys got started. K company being in the lead.

When we finally arrived, all of K company except the second lieutenant, two sergeants, the Herald man and one private had "fallen by the wayside" at different points along the line of march. Other companies were even worse.

Two prostrations were recorded and dozens of men were down and out. It is declared the most foolish, senseless march that the Texas militia has ever had to go through and the "cussing" Col. Lyons got was rich and abundant.

By this time the hospital wagon was full, and many of the men had been given passes and sent by train to Austin. There was guard duty all that night and the boys were on the march at 4 a. m. the next morning.

At 11 a. m. our advance guard came up with the advance guard of the blues. With advances and short stops in the boiling sun, the hike continued until 4 p. m. with no dinner.

The big engagement was fought about four miles from Austin. K company and the other companies in the rear never once came into action. Anyway, there were only about 10 of K company left as the rest had fallen out along the road.

Big Springs, Texas, Aug. 14.—The first bale of this year's cotton crop was brought in by W. P. Edwards of Glasscock county. It sold for 12 cents per pound and a premium of \$77.50 was given by the business men of the town.
