Dr. Parkhurst ON THE CRISIS THAT GERMANY MAY BRING.

Says It Is Patent That Germany Has Not Built Up Her Splendid Military Power for Purposes of Purely Defensive Purposes.

IN the present situation of strained political relations in Europe it must have occurred to all that Germany has not built up its splendid military power for purposes that are purely defensive.

Other nations, for the most part, have been adding to the efficiency of their army and navy in order to be prepared to be assaulted. It is generally conceded that Germany, on the contrary, has been getting ready to MAKE an assault, not to RECEIVE one.

She does not expect that any power is going to act against her on the offensive. It is generally understood, or at least assumed, that it is she that is going to take the offensive in making, somewhere or other, a larger and wider way for herself; it may be in the direction of the Mediterranean or of the North Sea, or of one of the states of South America—Brazil perhaps.

It may be that the conference in progress between the queen and prince consort of Holland and the king and queen of Belgium is in view of the covetous eye that William is supposed to be fixing on the Netherlands.

At any rate, the German equipment has been improved to a state of efficiency unparalleled in the world's history, and the popular belief is that that result has been achieved, not out of mere motives of pride, or for the bare amusement of the thing, but with an intention, more or less detailed in scope, to use such equipment in breaking through present geographical limitations and escaping into a larger liberty of domain.

Austria Would Stand by Germany if Any Blow Were Struck. And such are the relations subsisting between Germany and the Teutonic portion of the dual empire of Francis Joseph that when Germany strikes Austria may at least surmise that Austria will be found standing near by, unless prevented by check put upon her on the side of Italy.

Granting the reasonableness of the foregoing representation, when might it be expected that circumstances would be more favorable than NOW for the dealing of any blow that Germany may have in contemplation?

Russia is out of commission. The Netherlands can offer no substantial opposition, and the German ambition, never Dutch chivalry may have been in the days of Philip the Second and the duke of Alva.

France has only recently been bowled down by Germany like a stack of straw, and, as for England, her own prophets have repeatedly advertised her military unpreparedness, an advertisement made unnecessary by the had display she made of herself in the Boer war.

There are, then, four inefficiencies; and four inefficiencies will not sum up into one efficiency.

The theory which we have just built up has some good timber in it, but will very likely be knocked over by the progress of events.

Taft Looms Big in Giving Credit to the Democrats. THE acknowledgment which Mr. Taft has publicly made of his indebtedness to the Democratic party for the services rendered in passing the reciprocity bill will hardly strengthen his position with those whose business it is to arrange an act of candor on his part and of statesmanship and who believe in frank and honest dealing under any and all circumstances.

It illustrates a feature of the president's character which will certainly grow in the future, and which is the growing confidence which the people at large have in him as a man. It is an American instinct to think loyally of those who try to do their duty.

He probably rectified that his act would be the means of still further complicating his relations with the leaders of the party that elected him, but the act is to be interpreted as an expression of the fact that one may be a good enough to transcend party limitations, and also an expression of the fact that a chief executive has no right to allow himself to be managed by the organization to which he owes his office, and no right to allow himself to be handicapped by what he may consider to be the mistakes and inadequate convictions of that organization.

That that is Mr. Taft's view of the matter is indicated by his whole bearing in this reciprocity question, a question distinctly uncongenial to Republicanism.

His attitude was an announcement of his opinion, while, as an individual, he is a Republican, as president he is something more, and that his ownership by his party must be held under rigid subjection to the larger ownership under which he is held by his country.

Though elected by Republicans, that fact does not justify his being a Republican president. He is chief executive of the entire population, not merely of a small majority of it. He has been put in charge of the interests of the country at large, not of any single section of it.

Whether or not I voted for him he is president, and as president he is elected. So far as my personality extends he belongs to me. The more straitened a man is in his political partisanship the more hotly he will resent the views above stated. Copyright, 1911, National News Association.

I was afraid to go to Mexico after hearing all of the alarming reports about conditions there, but I had no trouble in going any place I pleased and I find everything optimistic about the future of the country."
