

STATEHOOD BILL GETS HEARING IN HOUSE

(Continued from page one) several messages from New Mexico thanking him for his efforts for a statehood...

"God bless you, William Alden. May you live a thousand years to cheer and bless New Mexico, now smiling through her tears..."

Taft Commended. The Journal-Miner, of Prescott, has wired President Taft that the united Republicans of northern Arizona commend his "fearless and patriotic" veto of the statehood bill.

Senate Passes Measure. Statehood for New Mexico and Arizona on a basis acceptable to president yesterday through the passage of the Flood-Smith resolution presented by senator William Alden Smith...

The resolution was adopted 52 to 8 after a debate in which the house was charged with evading a vote on the president's statehood veto...

The new resolution requires that Arizona shall eliminate from its present constitution all provisions for federal provision it shall be admitted to the union, and New Mexico is instructed to vote again on a change in its constitution designed to make that act more easily consummated...

Senator Bristow, of Kansas, would not support any other resolution until the house had acted on the vetoed measure.

Chairman Flood, of the house territories committee, was in the senate chamber most of the afternoon, and it was generally understood that house Democratic leaders were anxious for the opportunity of voting on the new resolution, rather than to be forced to vote on the vetoed one.

During part of the debate, attorney general Wickert, postmaster general Hitchcock and secretaries Stimson and Nagel were in the senate chamber. Mr. Hitchcock listened while senator Reed, of Missouri, Democrat, criticized the president for trying to force Arizona to give up its recall of judges and read a telegram arraigning Mr. Hitchcock for his political activity in Arizona.

The telegram, dated Phoenix, declared that "Hitchcock during the campaign for the election of delegates to our constitutional convention traveled over Arizona, with different federal officials, holding quiet little receptions at which plans were made for the defeat of the candidates who stood pledged for a progressive constitution."

Taft's name was freely used and insinuations were made concerning projected federal buildings. His friends told the Arizona Gazette to be good, or Republican patronage would cease. The Gazette refused to be coerced and the patronage did cease.

Practically every postmaster in Arizona immediately became active fighting the progressive constitution. It is well known that his visit influenced papers in Tucson, Yuma, Globe and Prescott.

The telegram was signed "C. H. Ackers, acting chairman" and "J. L. Twin, secretary." Mr. Hitchcock sat through senator Reed's speech with an inscrutable smile.

"The objection is not to the recall of judges," declared senator Reed. "The president, through his satellites and of fideholders, was unable to dictate the action of the people of Arizona and we find him now using his power to prevent the people of that state from being admitted to the union."

Despite many objections to the resolution, all Democrats voted for it except senators Bailey, of Texas, and Pomeroy, of Ohio. The Republicans who voted against it were: Bourne, of Oregon; Brandegee, of Connecticut; Bristow, of Kansas; Clapp, of Minnesota; Cummins of Iowa, and Heyburn, of Idaho.

It was apparent that the vetoed statehood resolution could not have been passed by a two-thirds vote in either house.

PHOENIX RECEIVES STATEHOOD NEWS WITHOUT DEMONSTRATION. Phoenix, Ariz., Aug. 19.—News of the passage by the senate of the Smith-Flood resolution for the admission of Arizona and New Mexico as states was received quietly in this city, although generally gratifying to all political elements.

No celebration has been planned pending final action on the bill.

DOUGLAS REJOICES; PLANS A BIG STATEHOOD RALLY. Douglas, Ariz., Aug. 19.—Douglas went wild over the news of the Smith bill passing the senate yesterday.

For more than half an hour whistles of the smelters, waterworks, and other establishments, church and school bells and shouts of men and boys made an indescribable din.

The national colors are floating from every flagpole in the city and from many residences. A big parade, torchlight procession and speech making is planned whenever word is received that the president has signed the bill.

Leaders of the element who most ardently advocated the passage of the Flood resolution, have little to say save that they are glad to see statehood.

SANTA FE REJOICES AT STATEHOOD CHANCE. Santa Fe, N. M., Aug. 19.—Santa Fe was wildly excited last night over the passage of the statehood bill in the senate.

The moment after the news had been flashed into the city, whistles were blowing, bells ringing and vast crowds gathered around the newspaper bulletin boards. The regimental band was called out and there was a meeting of political leaders.

Four former governors of the territory are in the city, George Curry, W. T. Thornton, M. A. Otero and L. Bradford Prince.
