Considering the importance of the \$40,000 bond issue providing for a new wing to the courthouse, the taxpayers of El Paso county are not taking the interest in the election that has been predicted. Up to 12 o'clock Tuesday there had been less than 20 votes polled out of three polling places, and at one of these, the Central fire station, only three votes had been cast.

It is predicted that the issue will be carried. The bonds will bear 5 percent interest and will be issued for a period of 40 years.

The county, by its recent improvements in the shape of an addition to the county jail, road and bridge improvements, has been at great expense, and there is agitation to provide for a new poor farm, and to other improve the county hospital or replace it with another.
