Pekin, China, Nov. 11.—The throne and government alternate between hope and despair today. Yuan Shi Kai today telegraphed that he was unable to come to Peking and expressed a pessimistic view of the situation.

"I do not expect to be able to effect the desired pacification," he said. "Moreover, my health is so feeble that I am unable to assume the post of premier."

Amoy, China, Nov. 11.—Attacks by robber bands in different quarters threw this city into a panic today. The authorities are self constituted and dealt with the situation the best they could. A water patrol captured a pirate junk with its crew of 18, who will be decapitated.
