LIVESTOCK TEXAS CATTLE ARE UNDER QUARANTINE

West Texas Not Affected by Ruling of Secretary Wilson

Washington, D. C., Nov. 13.—James Wilson, secretary of agriculture, has quarantined the area hereinafter described and that the interstate movement of cattle of the area quarantined to any point not located in the quarantine area shall be made only in accordance with the regulations of the secretary of agriculture. The infected district in Texas is very scattered, but on the whole it may be said to lie pretty generally from the south and east, a line drawn from Hardeman county, passing through that county, as it is partly in the infected district, towards the southwest through to Sevier county, Martin, Midland, Crane, Reeves, through the middle of Pecos and Terrell, will mark the approximate danger line.

JOE CANON TELLS KANSANS OF CULBERTSON CATTLE

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 12.—The Telegram of this city, says: J. Y. Canon, of Van Horn, Texas, belongs in a big country, Mr. Canon formerly lived in El Paso county, which was about the size of a New England state. That county was cut in two, so he is now in Culbertson county. The best part of the state has never been seriously disturbed by settlers, so big outfits are still doing business there. One cattle outfit near him owns over 700 sections of land. "Mountains and valleys make up the physical surface of our country," Mr. Canon said. "It is strictly a cattle country, but the cattle are not all there, or at least there is a big shortage, caused largely by a two years' drought which existed previous to the present year. Grass is abundant this season, and cattle fattened three quarters than they did in Kansas. No attempt is made at farming. Cattle range all the year round without being fed. There are no sheep in that section, so we are all alone in our glory with our cattle."
