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Brigadier General Adam G. Malloy

A Sketch of His Life by Thomas McEniry, One of His Captains.

BRIGADIER GENERAL Adam G. Malloy, who died last week, was a native of Tipperary, Ireland. He came to America with his parents in his infancy. His father joined the fourth United States Infantry, when Adam was about 14 years old, and Adam also joined as a fifer.

The regiment accompanied the American army, which passed through here on its way to the Mexican war. Malloy's mother accompanied them also, as a nurse, and later in Fort Worth she did in the British army, that 20 wives of soldiers could accompany each company abroad.

Adam's father was killed at the battle of Besaca, Mexico, when Adam dropped the rifle for a musket and received minor wounds. After that war he settled in Baraboo, Wis., then a frontier and did service in Indian affairs.

At the first call of Lincoln for 75,000 volunteers he aided in raising a company of the "Iron brigade," and went to the department of the Potomac. When a call for 500,000 men came he resigned and returned to Wisconsin, and with others formed the "Irish brigade," known by number as the 17th Wisconsin volunteer infantry of which he went out as lieutenant colonel.

Awaiting the arrival of "Springfield" at Benton barracks, St. Louis, he proceeded to St. Louis, then to Ford, then to Corinth, Miss., where he was in command of the 17th.

Malloy was an expert drill master as we were often called the "regulars," of McKee's division. Corinth fell as well as Tupelo, Shreveport, Rains, Inka and Burnsville. The second battle of Corinth came when we fought under Rosecrans, Col. John L. Doran's family, who were stopping at a "union" house, outside the lines were captured. Under a flag of

truce Doran was permitted to go to his family, resigned and returned to McKee's with them.

Adam G. Malloy was made colonel of the regiment commanding it at Holly Springs and Vicksburg. Later on we were in Gen. James A. MacArthur's division, Ransom's brigade and McPherson's division. During the Georgia campaign we were in M. D. Leggett's division and later in Forrest's or Corde's when he was wounded and Malloy was brevetted brigadier general.

It was Malloy's regiment that threw the hand grenades to our friends across the breastworks and it was also his command that constructed the line of parallels closest to Atlanta.

At the fall of Atlanta, Malloy was made brigadier general. On to the sea he marched as commanding officer of the second brigade in the third division of the 15th army corps, army of the Tennessee, military division of the Mississippi, and to Washington.

To Malloy's brigade was assigned the post of honor in being the first to pass in review of Sherman's grand army, after national affairs were settled. He resigned his life captaincy in the regular army and came to Texas to aid in reconstruction as he was well posted in state, national and international laws.

A funny incident as related by him to me in this city, happened when it was agreed by the candidate for governor, Malloy's friend, and a Democrat, that if he were elected, Malloy should have the appointment of two of the governor's staff. He was elected, Malloy got a wire that only one was accepted. He hastened to Austin and saw the governor, who told him to get another man, that he did not want any man on his staff that parted his hair in the middle.

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"The second friend on whom I called wasn't at home; her husband was. He had drunk himself out of a job, and she was downtown supporting him. Her wedding was one of the most romantic ever known.

"A third was discovered, a fourth had put her children in an orphan's home and disappeared, and a fifth, whose husband said he really loved her, and who loved him, hadn't been on a railroad train since her marriage. But she took her photograph with him on his trips, and that meant so much to a woman!

"A wife to give her lovers time to sniff scornfully. Then she resumed. "I had asked the young man for a week, but the next afternoon I telegraphed him his answer. You may think it was a refusal, but no! I wired him I would be ready to marry him within a month!"

IMMIGRATION MEN TO HOLD CONFERENCE State and Federal Officials to Try to Get Together

Washington, D. C., Nov. 15.—One of the most far reaching and important national conferences held in Washington this fall, will be opened tomorrow in the "getting together" conference of state and federal immigration officials. It is held under the auspices of the federal government and will last through Saturday. The main object for which the conference is called is to arrange the better distribution of immigrants among the various states in the hope of preventing the segregation of distinctive types in large cities.

Under the present laws every state has the right to have representatives at immigration ports, but through the workings of the immigration system, this has been approaching immigrants and trying to induce them to move to any particular state, has not worked well. The immigrant upon arriving generally has some objective point in view, and nearly always it is one of the larger cities.

In the west particularly, there is need for settlers. Western states have made inducements as to land grants, should the immigrant desire to lead an agricultural life; others have offered inducements to be made in locating in manufacturing or mining districts.

The conference will not have a set program. Each delegate from the various parts of the country, the west and south particularly, will come prepared to talk about questions that arise

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In the three days' discussion. In speaking of the meeting to be held here, Mr. Powderly, who has long been identified with immigration matters, said that this conference is to be a convention in the interests of better cooperation between the department of agriculture and the federal immigration bureau, looking to better and more complete manner of distributing immigrants.

The outcome of the conference, he said, will be that a better understanding will be effected between the federal and state governments and that the immigration bureau will be better conducted.
