

TOO LITTLE AID FOR THE VALLEY

Local Merchants Accused of Discriminating Against It

Farmers of the El Paso valley met at the chamber of commerce and formed a permanent organization Saturday.

Address were made by professors W. T. Conway, Elmer Stearns and Fabian Garcia, of the New Mexico A. and M. college, and by district engineer W. M. Reed, of the reclamation service.

J. D. Porcher presided at the meeting and H. L. Edwards acted as secretary. The organization expects to have a cooperative system for purchasing supplies and selling products.

Charles R. Stevens, who says he is an agriculturist because he farms by proxy, urged that the association endeavor to secure the \$10,000 or \$20,000 that will be left over from the Pearson bonus to secure a canning factory for El Paso.

No Valley Boosting. Rev. Miles Hanson, who conducts a farm near Yelita, complained of the lack of valley boosting by El Paso merchants.

He said: "You hear them say 'boost the valley' in El Paso, but they do little for it."

Prof. W. T. Conway urged the conservation of the soil, saying: "There are many who think our soil is so rich that it will never lose its fertility."

But in the upper valley we are urging the raising of dairy cattle in order to add to its fertility. In improving our farms, we want to improve our homes for the home life has much to do with the success of the farm.

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FT. HUACHUCA TO HAVE A RAILROAD

Southwestern and Southern Pacific Have Surveyed to Post

That the El Paso & Southwestern will put a spur line from its present right of way at Charleston to the government reservation at Fort Huachuca, is a rumor freely discussed among local railroad men.

H. J. Simmons, general manager of the road, admits that a survey has been made for the line, which is a distance of about 14 miles, but says nothing definite has been decided as to its construction.

The present right of way of the road runs within 14 miles of the post, Charleston being the nearest station to the reservation. The present method of traveling is highly inconvenient to both the soldiers and any civilian who may have occasion to visit the fort.

Officers at the post are now boosting for the building of a first class, modern hotel on the reservation to accommodate visitors who come from time to time. This proposition has been put up to the citizens of Douglas, Hibe and Tucson.

A survey for the construction of the spur road from Huachuca station to Fort Huachuca, about seven miles, has just been completed by Southern Pacific engineers.

It is for the transportation to the fort of building materials to be used in erecting seven large buildings recently authorized by the war department and for general freight business and for the convenience of the troops at the regimental post.
