POWDER CONCERN SEEKING LOCATION

Bouglas, Ariz., Dec. 12.—The Pacific Steeltite company, a corporation of San Francisco, has written the chamber of commerce asking for information for local conditions which would be favorable for the establishment of a branch of its factory at or near here, for the southern part of the county. The company will acquire 100 acres for a site and from the tone of the letter evidently expects to acquire a portion of this site to be donated. The company proposes to erect a factory at a cost of \$25,000, giving employment to nearly 100 people.

DEVELOPMENT PECS RELEGES PECOS SCARGE

Many People Improving Land—Californian Is Pleased With Place

Pecos, Tex., Dec. 12.—Among those who started in improving irrigated land this week is W. A. Armstrong, of Lovell, Okla., who has bought 400 acres of land at McKee's Heights. He will this week begin the construction of a nice farm house and out-buildings.

John M. Cubba, a resident of the pumped water district, near Fresno, Cal., after spending ten days in this district, stated that he considered the Pecos pumped water shallow water field equally as good as that at Fresno and easier of development.

"Outside of citrus fruits," said the Californian, "I cannot see where we have anything over here except that we are about 10 percent developed and you are only about 1 percent developed. Your average yield is larger and your land is not nearly so dry as that near Fresno was when the present shallow water field was developed."

Several families have moved to Pecos recently, and at this time it is impossible to rent a house in the city. There is a great demand for houses in the city unable to secure residences, among them J. E. Carter of Butte, Mont., the new holder of the Tri-State Telephone company here.

Third Water Plant at Knowles. News received here from Knowles, N. M., states that the third pumped water irrigation plant has been put in there. This is the latest field where water has been pumped water irrigation development.

The plant installed at Knowles last week, which is the largest in the world, president of the Bank of Knowles, has proved a wonderful success. Several acres of onions planted netted \$100 per acre.

Water lies under the Knowles country at a depth of 100 feet, this being the first stratum that is larger and deeper, where a small stratum of surface water was struck. Here a centrifugal pump was put in, the water rising to within 21 feet of the surface. The earth on tank was constructed and the water pumped into this, the measurements of which are 200x200 feet. The water was distributed into the laterals and ditches. All laterals are run by square gates.

J. J. Garrett, of Knowles, blanded a small alfalfa field on his farm near Knowles the past year and made six cuttings. It is expected by parties in and around the Knowles field that more than 500 pumping plants will go in during the coming 12 months.

TWO RESIDENCE ADDITIONS OPENED

Roswell Is Spreading Out Rapidly: West Virginians Buy Farms

Roswell, N. M., Dec. 12.—Roswell is expanding rapidly and new additions are being made. The first was the 120 acres opened by the Institute Land company two weeks ago. Then C. J. Wagner bought the 16 acre tract lying just west of Capt. W. C. Held in the city. Col. Wagner will lay the tract off in town lots.

The first of a series of social center lectures to be given under the auspices of the Roswell High school has been held. Dr. Frank N. Brown, chairman of the Parks and Boulevard committee of the Commercial club, lectured on the subject of "Parks and Boulevards," bringing out the points that Roswell has no parks worth while and should get busy at once and buy land, as it will be so high in a few months as to make it impossible.

The three foot Main street walk expansion will be finished this week. The city is putting in a conduit preparatory to installing the boulevard lighting system.

West Virginia families have bought farms in the Pecos valley the last week. G. N. White, a former banker of Tulsa, Okla., has bought the Leland farm, has remodeled the residence on the place.


Atkinson, president of the Roswell-Midland Inter-county roads, has called the committee to meet in Carlsbad Wednesday, when definite plans for the construction of the road.

McCreary Is Again Governor Of Kentucky After 36 Years



Inauguration of Venerable Statesman Marks Opening of New Capitol

Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 12.—After an absence of 36 years, James B. McCreary today came back to the capitol as governor of Kentucky, for the second time in a third of a century. He will be the eighth of office as chief executive of this state. At the age of 72 he took the oath of office for his second term, being the only man in this country to serve as governor of a state twice with so wide an interval of time elapsing between his terms of office.

Escorted by 12 of the survivors of the old McCreary guards, the company of militia which entered in a third of a century ago, the governor and his family were in the city when he was governor in 1876, and by 5000 shouting, joyous Democrats from all over the state, he was escorted to the capitol. The governor headed the parade through the streets of Frankfort to the new capitol where the oath of office was administered by chief justice of the court of appeals, Judge James P. Hobson.

With the swearing in the new governor, there went out of office Augustus D. Willson. When he went into office four years ago, Gov. Willson said he expected to go out of office the most disliked man who was ever the governor of Kentucky. For a time during the longest and largest of his terms, Gov. Willson used the military to patrol the troubled districts, the governor realized his mistake when he was elected and Gov. Willson went out of office at peace, the breach in his own party having been healed.

Democrats of Kentucky celebrated today the return of James B. McCreary to the Democratic party, after being out for four years. Gov. McCreary was elected in 1907, and the Democracy of the state came to the capitol today to celebrate. The inaugural parade was the longest and largest in the history of Kentucky, as a bachelor. He has employed a housekeeper and will have no one living in the mansion with him except his stenographer. It is the first time, except for a few months when Gov. J. C. Beckham was in the executive chair, that Kentucky has had no mistress of the mansion.

Gov. McCreary has been one of the most honored of Kentuckians. He was elected governor of this state in 1876, his opponent at that time being the late Justice John M. Harlan. During that campaign, the candidates engaged in joint debate, speaking from the same stump for two months, but no bitterness ever crept into the speeches and there was never the usual indulging in personalities. Gov. McCreary served one term in Congress from 1880 to 1881, after he was elected United States senator. He was defeated, the only time in his life, in a Democratic primary or convention, by former Gov. Beckham, who was nominated for United States senator in 1907. After his retirement as senator, Gov. McCreary was elected president of the A. M. S. society in 1908 and served in that capacity until last summer, when he resigned to prosecute his campaign for the governorship. He says this will be the last office he expects to hold and declares he will serve the cause of the people.

IRRIGATION GROWS FAST IN 10 YEARS

Reclamation Service Has Constructed 6 Percent of the Works

Washington, D. C., Dec. 12.—Director Durand of the bureau of the census issued today the first official statement relative to the statistics of irrigation in the United States, collected as a part of the 12th census.

The total number of farms irrigated in 1905 in the arid and semiarid states, comprising all or parts of Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington, Wyoming and part of Texas, was 157,884, against 107,715 in 1899, an increase of 50,169, or 46.6 percent. Between 1899 and 1905 the whole number of farms in the states mentioned increased 31.3 percent.

The total acreage irrigated in the arid and semiarid states was 15,739,439 acres in 1905, against 7,500,000 in 1899, an increase of 8,239,439, or 109.7 percent. The area included in the reclamation program under construction was, in the arid and semiarid states, 3,112,110 acres in 1910, an excess of 17,627,329 acres over the acreage irrigated in 1905. These figures indicate in a general way the area which will be available within the next few years for the extension of irrigation, and show that the area irrigated in 1909 can be more than doubled without undertaking new enterprises.

Many Private Canals. The number of independent enterprises reported in 1910 in the arid and semiarid states was 2,469. The total length of all ditches was 125,675 miles, of which 57,236 miles were in main canals and 68,439 miles in laterals. The number of reservoirs reported was 6,943, having a combined capacity of 15,872,256 acre feet. The number of wells pumped for irrigation was 14,534, and the number of all pumping plants 13,851. The acreage irrigated with pumped water was 47,288 acres. Flowing wells supplied water to 125,536 acres.

The total cost of irrigation systems reported in the arid and semiarid states in 1910 was \$1,454,257,189, or 35.1 percent. The average cost per acre was \$15.76 in 1910 against \$8.89 in 1899, an increase of 77.7 percent. The average cost of operation and maintenance per acre was \$1.07 in 1909.

The figures showing the acreage the plants were capable of irrigating in 1910 give the reclamation service about 4 percent of the total, the Carey act about 6 percent, of the total and the Indian service about 3 percent. Of the acreage included in projects, the reclamation service shows about 6 percent, the Carey act about 8 percent, and the Indian service about 3 percent.


