Washington, D. C., Dec. 22.—Republican members of the ways and means committee summoned by representative Payne, of New York, former chairman of the committee, today began the preparation of a revised wool tariff schedule based on the report of the tariff board and the message of president Taft.

## DEMOCRATIC MEASURE EXPECTED TO PASS

Washington, D. C., Dec. 22.—Republican members of the ways and means committee summoned by representative Payne, of New York, former chairman of the committee, today began the preparation of a revised wool tariff schedule based on the report of the tariff board and the message of president Taft.

President Taft having pronounced the report of the board as the most scientific made on the subject, the admiring and Republican leaders in the house have determined to draft a bill founded entirely on the data. With this bill they will go before the country.

Republican members of the committee who began work on the bill were Payne of New York, Haddock of Pennsylvania, McCall of Massachusetts, Hill of Connecticut, Neuman of California, Fordney of Michigan and Longworth of Ohio.

Taft to Cooperate.  
The president, it is said, will cooperate with the Republican members in their work of drafting the bill, which, it is said, will give all branches in the domestic wool industry the protection necessary to place them on an equality with foreign branches.

Raw wool of the American farmer will be protected enough to keep out cheap wool from Australia, Argentina and other countries, and the manufacturers will be protected in the same way, the protection representing the difference between the cost of raising and marketing here and abroad. It is the purpose of the Republicans to present their bill to the full ways and means committee and urge the Democrats to accept it.

Democrats Plan a Bill.  
This culmination will probably not result, as the Democrats under the leadership of representative Underwood intend to write their own bill immediately after the holidays. They will compare the statistics of the tariff board with their own collection and probably will get it through the House. Some difficulty may be encountered in the senate, however.

Should the Democratic bill pass both houses the administration is expected to make a campaign before the people.

## TRIAL OF WOMAN IS RESUMED IN GOLDEN

Golden, Colo., Dec. 22.—The cross examination of Mrs. Amelia Garrazone, charged with murdering Mrs. Maria Laguardia, was resumed when court opened today. The defendant was questioned regarding the contents of letters said to have been written by Laguardia to his wife in which he said he was afraid to return to Denver.

## PERSIA WILL SUBMIT TO RUSSIA

Teheran, Persia, Dec. 22.—The Persian cabinet has given to the Russian minister, S. Peklevsk-Konell, verbal assurances of its intention to comply with the demands of the Russian ultimatum. W. Morgan Shuster, the American treasurer general, will be dismissed.

## MEANS DISCHARGE OF AMERICAN TREASURER

London, England, Dec. 22.—The British foreign office shortly after noon received official confirmation from the Persian minister at Teheran that Persia has yielded before the Russian threats and had granted all the demands contained in the Russian ultimatum of November 21. These included the dismissal of W. Morgan Shuster, the American who has been acting as treasurer general of Persia since June last.

Russia Is Notified.  
St. Petersburg, Dec. 22.—The Persian charge d'affaires called officially at the foreign office today and announced that Persia had yielded to Russia's demand in an audience with M. Zasloucki, the foreign secretary, he formally declared that Persia would concede all points in the Russian ultimatum.

The fighting between the Russians and the Persians, which was reported from Teheran yesterday, lasted throughout the day. The old city was bombarded.

## ITALIANS SEIZE BRITISH VESSEL

Was Carrying Money to the Turkish Troops in the Province of Yem

Alexandria, Egypt, Dec. 22.—The Italian cruiser Puglia today seized the British steamer Menzies of the Khartoum Mail steamship company with \$120,000 in gold on board, destined for the payment of Turkish troops at the port of Hodeida, in the Turkish province of Yem on the Red Sea.



## CUERNAVACA IN FEAR OF A REBEL ATTACK

Mexico City, Mexico, Dec. 22.—Following a skirmish between a body of federalists under Capt. Amador Vallejo and a strong body of Zapatistas at Tres Marias, 25 miles north of Cuernavaca Thursday, troops were held in readiness last night to repel an expected attack upon Cuernavaca. Points of vantage were manned with rapid fire guns and pickets guarded every approach. In the light at Tres Marias the rebels were beaten off. The federalists captured 16 horses and a quantity of arms.

## GRISENBECK IS NAMED AS CONSUL FOR MEXICO

San Antonio, Tex., Dec. 22.—Hugo Grisenbeck of this city, who was appointed Mexican consul to Vienna, Austria, by president Madero, is well known here. Mr. Grisenbeck was a schoolmate of president Madero, and when Madero was in San Antonio over a year ago, engaged in organizing a revolution against Diaz, Mr. Grisenbeck took an active part in Madero's affairs.

## COL. HAY HAS MEETING WITH GOVERNOR OF TEXAS

Austin, Texas, Dec. 22.—Consul general Manuel Estrava and Col. Eduardo Hay, at one time chief of staff for president Madero, and late inspector of police in Mexico City, were in conference with governor Colquitt yesterday. The nature of the conference was not made public.

## REYES NOT CAPTURED

Mexican army officers at Matamorras, headquarters for the state of Tamaulipas, deny that Gen. Reyes has been captured in that state, as reported in a dispatch from Mexico City. Matamorras is across the border from Brownsville and within 100 miles from Camargo, the border town near which Reyes is said to have been taken. Reyes is in the vicinity of Galeana, Nuevo Leon, according to Matamorras officials.
