SEWAGE PLANT TO BE READY FEB. 10

Delay in Arrival of Certain Parts Prevents Its Earlier Completion.

The city sewage disposal plant will be in operation about February 10 or 15. Several parts of the machinery have been delayed in transit.

J. W. Hadlock is working a force of 54 men on the 2500 foot ditch which will run from the plant to the river for the purpose of carrying off the waste water.

Already 500 feet of this ditch have been completed and it is expected to finish the work by February 1.

The ditch will be 10 feet high and 10 feet wide at the top and 20 feet at the bottom. It will be elevated because the city has no property on which it may dump the water and therefore must carry it to the river. All turns in the ditch will be reinforced with galvanized iron, while the walls will be of natural construction, the adobe soil serving this purpose to good advantage.
