

CARNEGIE, ROCKEFELLER STEEL TRUST CHARGES

Declare Nothing Withheld From Roosevelt; Gary Dinners Not Significant.

TREASON, N. J., Feb. 1.—Absolute denial of alleged violations of the anti-trust law is made by the United States Steel corporation, its subsidiaries, and directors in their answers filed this morning in the United States court in this case.

The effect of its origin, the corporation declares, has been to cheapen product, effect economy and increase foreign trade from \$1,000,000 to \$40,000,000 annually within 19 years. So long has the government acquiesced in its existence, the answer says, that it is now too late, as a matter of equity, to insist that its organization was illegal.

Nothing was withheld from president Roosevelt by Messrs. Gary and Frick on November 4, 1907, the answer says, when they sought his consent to the corporation's proposed purchase of the Tennessee Coal and Iron and Railway company, nor were the so-called Gary dinners productive of agreements to restrain the free trade of iron and steel.

The Messrs. Rockefeller deny that they had an active part in the formation or maintenance of the corporation, the elder Rockefeller, declaring that he has had no immediate return to the iron and steel business since 1891.

Mr. Carnegie says he had no part in the plans for organizing the corporation and that he never advised, directly or indirectly, the directors of the corporation, in its management. He admitted selling the Carnegie Steel company to the United States Steel corporation, but denies that he conspired with the Carnegie company or its subsidiaries to be restrained of trade.

The answer, by Edmund Converse, a director of the United States Steel corporation, is similar to the corporation's answer. Each of the defendants prays that the suit be dismissed.

The Trustee's Answer. Broadly speaking, the answer of the United States Steel corporation is a general denial to the allegations of the government. It denies the organization of the subsidiary companies, declares that they were formed in violation of the anti-trust act, claims that they were a normal and necessary development of the times, and insists that instead of restraining trade or commerce, they have developed and increased the same.

The answer is made in the name of the United States Steel corporation and its various subsidiary companies and is joined in by the following individuals: J. Pierpont Morgan, Elbert H. Gary, Charles M. Schwab, Andrew Carnegie, Henry C. Frick, James Gayley, William H. Moore, James H. Moore, Percival Roberts, George W. Perkins, Norman H. Beam, George W. Perkins and Peter A. B. Widener.

The answer begins with reviewing the events that led up to the organization of the present steel corporation and describes how the Federal Steel company acquired the Carnegie Steel company, the American Steel and Wire company, and others through negotiations conducted by J. P. Morgan & Company. Later, when the need for additional supplies was felt, the Steel corporation acquired properties of the Lake Superior iron range, the Pittsburg Steel corporation was formed and its properties acquired, the answer declares, for the purpose of increasing production by integrating the plants and the processes employed in the manufacture of steel, and to reach the industrial markets of the United States and of foreign countries and increase the trade in steel products therein.

"If any of the companies mentioned by the Steel corporation," the answer declares, "had been organized for the purpose or with the effect of restraining trade or commerce, or if they constituted an attempt at monopoly or a monopolization of trade or commerce, neither the Steel corporation nor the United States Steel corporation had any knowledge or information thereof when the said companies were acquired."

Continuing, the answer recites that the Steel corporation made its purposes and its details in a variety of ways, and says that the attention of the officers of the United States Steel corporation was particularly attracted to the organization at that time it was effected.

Chicago, Feb. 19.—The answer of the Steel corporation has cheapened the production of steel to the consumer.

"This defendant denies all and all manner of unlawful acts, practices, wherein he is in anywise by the said petition charged; all of which matters and charges the defendant denies, and is willing to prove as this honorable court shall direct and prays to be hence dismissed with his reasonable costs and charges in this behalf most wrongfully sustained."

The answer of John D. Rockefeller, Jr. follows substantially that of his father.
