



HUNT JARS THE ARIZONA POLITICIANS

never yet had a chance to inaugurate a state governor and they will not let the affair go entirely by default. So they are making plans for a few "goings." Committees representing the board of trade, the municipal officials, and the business men have been holding meetings and laying plans for the event. At least they will have out of the company of militia, a band, and a large number of citizens. There will not be a ball, but there will be a banquet. Also, there may be a parade, though that affair has not been settled yet.

Leaders Are Joined. Governor Hunt has given a rather severe jolt to some of the Democratic leaders. As printed in The Herald at the time, on the Sunday following the election, several of the wheel horses of the state Democracy held a conference in this city at which all the appointive plums were parcelled out. This conference proceeded to announce that Mulford Winsor, who was beaten by Hayden for the Democratic nomination for representative, would be made private secretary to the governor, that Tom Weedin, who had opposed Mr. Hunt for the gubernatorial nomination, would be warden of the penitentiary at Florence, and so on clear down the line. All this work was done, apparently, with the kindest motives in the world. The conferees didn't even ask Mr. Hunt to be present. They didn't even ask him to go to the trouble of suggesting men for appointment—in fact, they took the whole burden off his shoulders and left him nothing to do but sign the commissions.

But now Mr. Hunt has come out with a statement. He says he hasn't made up his mind yet regarding the appointments and that he is going to take his time about it. He wants to investigate the state institutions where appointments are to be made, with the object of informing himself thoroughly as to their needs. And he mentions the state

prison particularly, which would seem to indicate that Mr. Weedin hasn't even been considered. The governor says he will make a few of the necessary appointments on the day of inauguration, but that nobody but himself will know who the appointees are to be until the announcement is made. All of which will probably give the "leaders" of the party in Arizona something to think about.

Roosevelt Is Boosted. Work of forming a Roosevelt club here goes on apace. The men in charge of this work say they are meeting with flattering success, though, contrary to public expectation, there has been no meeting for organization purposes yet. This meeting will be held soon, however, when the real strength of the movement in Phoenix will develop. The prime movers in the campaign are former governor Joseph W. Kibbey and Dwight B. Heard, both personal friends of the former president. A similar movement has been started at Tucson and both clubs will be affiliated with the national organization, with headquarters in Chicago.

It will not be at all surprising if the Roosevelt supporters capture the state delegation from the fact that the Taft men do not seem to be doing anything to head off the movement. There never has been any talk of making a fight on behalf of La Follette here. It seems to be taken for granted that it is to be either a Taft or a Roosevelt delegation.
