RILEY GEORGE IS ADMITTED TO BAIL IN DEMING; NEW WELL RIG TO BORE WELLS IN MIMBRES VALLEY

Deming, N. M., Feb. 10.—Riley George, charged with shooting his stepfather, U. E. McDaniel, has been admitted to bail in the sum of \$3000. The preliminary hearing has been set for next Thursday. Mr. McDaniel's condition is critical, but it will be several days, according to the statement of the physicians, before they will be able to determine whether or not the wound is fatal.
