

BLAST LEVELS A HILL IN CLIFTON

Sixteen Hundred Pounds of Powder Used to Remove Knob Hill.

Clifton, Ariz., Feb. 10.—Knob Hill, on the northern end of the new smelter site, has been leveled to the ground. A tunnel was driven in about 15 feet and a cross cut made at the end in which were placed four charges of powder. The blast of about 1500 pounds of powder was fired soon after the A. & N. M. passenger train had passed. The tracks were covered for some distance with earth, but a large force of men had them cleared before morning, and the outgoing train was only a few minutes late. A force of 150 more men has been engaged on the new site and the work is now assuming larger proportions and is progressing rapidly.


