FEAR FELT THAT REBELS ARE READY TO ATTACK CANANEA

(Continued from page 1.)

Chief interest today, so far as the situation in northern Mexico is concerned, is centered in the possible fate of Cananea. Juarez is an quiet, outwardly at least, as a New England village. Col. Salazar, who Thursday night was reported to have seized train at Sabinal and to have looted it with his command, about 1900 strong, for the purpose of bringing them into Juarez, seems to have changed his mind. He seized the train, all right, and then for reasons not made public at this end of the line, gave it up and allowed it to proceed southward, putting off for the time being the attack upon or invasion of Juarez.

Cananea Situation Critical.

At Cananea, however, the situation is different. Col. Espinosa, at the head of armed men, variously estimated at from 100 to 200 men, is in the vicinity of the big copper camp and camp. It is said, to attack and loot it. Col. Juan Canabal, the Maderista jefe de armas of the district, has fewer than 200 men at his command, and, while from his position he might be able to put up a good fight and stand off Espinosa for a time, there is a fear that he will not only have to fight Espinosa's band, but thousands of Cananeans who have not forgotten the riots of 1906 and who are eager to avenge the wrongs they think they suffered at the hands of Americans and others during the memorable three days of strike fighting, while the strike riots allied to were in progress.

May Prevent Attack.

Attempts are being made today, it is said, to dissuade Espinosa from making the attack and to induce him to change his line of march to the southward, in order to leave Cananea and its millions of dollars' worth of American and other foreign property, unharmed. The result of the negotiations, if they were put on foot as told in Juarez and El Paso, is not known. Espinosa's record as a looter, gained at Yabell and El Tigre, has brought many recruits to his standard and these recruits will probably have to be paid a high price to forego the privilege of sacking the rich stores of goods at Cananea.

North Western Trains Released.

At the general offices of the Mexico North Western, in Juarez, Friday morning, it was said that the special train sent out Thursday afternoon to Madera, and which had been stopped by Col. Salazar at Sabinal, was later released by Salazar and proceeded on its way to Madera, but whether or not it had reached the latter place had not been reported. It was believed by the company's agents at Madera and El Paso Thursday night that the residence section of Madera occupied by Mexican laborers had been burned, while not denied at the North Western offices, was not believed to be true. No report of such a fire had been made by the company's agents at Madera and it was believed that a fire of the magnitude reported would have been made a matter of official record, had it occurred.

JURY FINDS COHEN GUILTY OF BURGLARY

Simon Cohen was found guilty of burglarizing the room of J. A. Farmer, by a jury in the 34th district court Thursday and sentenced to serve two years in the state penitentiary.

It was charged that he had entered Farmer's room in a Mills street rooming house and took therefrom a suit case which was later identified by Farmer as his.
