

### SCHMITZ SET FREE; RUEF BACK TO PEN

San Francisco, Calif., March 6.—Eugene S. Schmitz, former mayor of San Francisco, indicted in May, 1907, on charges of having bribed a supervisor in the so-called gas cases, was set free by a superior court jury, acting under instructions from Judge William P. Lawler.

The court held that no evidence connecting the defendant with the crime of bribery had been introduced at the trial. Had the jury disregarded his instructions and found a verdict of guilty, he would have been forced to wet such a verdict aside, under the law, as interpreted by the state supreme court.

Both Schmitz and Ruef were in the courtroom during the proceedings today. After the jury had filed out, Judge Lawler entered an order for Ruef's return to San Quentin penitentiary. Ruef was brought here to testify against Schmitz, but refused to go on the stand. Ruef's attorney protested to this, saying:

"There must be some legal way whereby he should not be sent back to the penitentiary, when all of his co-defendants have been discharged from custody." The court must surely realize the injustice of this."
