CHURCH EDUCATORS MEET IN ST. LOUIS Two Thousand Delegates Representing All Religious Sects Attend.

St. Louis, Mo., March 11.—The first session of the ninth general convention of the Religious Education association was held in the Odeon auditorium here this afternoon, and was attended by nearly two thousand delegates, representing all the important sects in the country, including Catholic, Protestant and Jewish.

The discussion centered on churches and parsons, the general theme being "The Revolving Religious Education Through the Churches." Jonathan Le Moyne Snyder, president of the National Agricultural College, presided at the session with an address on "The Training of Religious Leaders of the Church in Rural Communities."

Mr. Snyder's discourse was followed by a discussion on the proper training of boys for leadership in religious work. The session was concluded by a devotional service.

The feature of tonight's service will be the annual address by the president of the Religious Education association, James Hampton Kirkland, chancellor of Vanderbilt University. Thomas G. Gallor, Episcopal bishop of Tennessee, will also deliver an address. His topic will be "Our Indebtedness to Religion."

Special sessions will be held tomorrow morning and afternoon for discussion and resolutions on the general theme will be "The Leadership of the Church in Rural Communities." A special session will also be held tomorrow afternoon by the Sunday school department.

MURCHISON TO BE HEAD OF NEW BANK Will Organize New State Bank and Trust Company in El Paso.

A state bank and trust company is to be organized by Frank Murchison, of the Rio Grande Valley Bank and Trust company. The room now occupied by A. P. Coles & Bros. in the Postal building has been leased and will be fitted with bank fixtures before June 1st, the date set for the opening of the new bank.

It is understood that Mr. Murchison's father, who is wealthy, will back his son in the new banking company.

The bank has not yet found a name, but it will be incorporated under the title of a state bank and trust company. A. P. Coles & Bros. will move into the room adjoining the present office, and formerly occupied by the Miller cigar store.

The capital stock of the new bank will be \$100,000.

CHRIST IS WITH US, EVER NEAR

Revivalist Urges His Hearers to Accept Him—Week's Program.

Rev. Arthur P. Bishop, D. D., of Austin, at the First Presbyterian church last night preached on the text Mt. 28:20, "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." His theme was "The Ever-Present Christ." Dr. Bishop said in part:

"These words mean to the disciples the withdrawal of his human form in order to his abiding with them forever. In his incarnation he laid aside the exercise though not the possession of many of the attributes of divinity and took upon himself the limitations of the flesh. Now he lays aside the limitations though not the possession of his humanity in order to be with them everywhere and always."

"These words extend the day of incarnation to all the days. They extend the holy land to all the lands of the earth. They extend the fellowship of the 120 brethren on the Galilean mountain top to all whom God has given him. They give a worldwide and time long significance to the word 'inasmuch as I live with you.' They make the whole world the theater of redeeming grace and all men everywhere possible subjects of its transforming power."

"To us, these words mean the reality of the presence of Jesus with us always. We have seen the condition of a great success. We live and work not only not as if we loved and served a dead Christ, not as if we loved and served an absent Christ. We love and serve a risen and glorified Christ, to whom every kind of authority hath been committed in heaven and on earth, and who is with us always even unto the end of the age. The promise is, if we will go with the message of the gospel, to the world, and the lost souls all about us, he will go with us and be with us always."

Illustrating his point with a story of Paganini and an old Stradivarius violin, the preacher closed with the words: "Jesus, the Master, is with us. He says: 'Go with me.' He made the man instrument, with his heart and voice and eye and touch. He says: 'Go with me.' He will give you a new life. He will bring you into harmony with his and through you he will play upon the emotions and affections and wills of others. Let us remember the Master is with us and let us go and say 'He is with us' and do what he bids us do. He will be with us always."

Dr. Bishop's subject tonight will be, "A Man's Keeper."

Farvin White, "The Sparrow Song" last night and will sing again tonight. Mr. White directs the congregation in the singing, which is a special and a strong feature of the meetings. He is assisted by a large chorus choir.

Dr. Bishop spoke Tuesday at the Southwestern shops. Wednesday he speaks at the high school. Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock he speaks at women at the First Presbyterian church. Friday afternoon at 4 he will conduct a meeting for children.

The public is invited to all meetings.

CONDITION OF SCHOOL FUNDS

When Apportionment is Made, Showing Will Be Excellent. Despite the fact that the expenses of the school board during the past year have been less than during the previous year, the overdraft shows at the present time an increase of \$14,101.42 over that of the previous year.

However, this is due to the fact that the school board has not allowed its apportionment of school funds by the state and as the time for paying city taxes has been extended until April 1, the city apportionment has not been made. Mayor C. E. Keay said Tuesday morning that the next statement of the schools will show a better condition than ever before in the history of the city.

The statement of the financial condition at present prepared for the school board by auditor F. E. Sawyer, was to have been presented Monday night but no meeting was held. It will be presented Wednesday night and will show as follows:

PUEBLO RANCHER RAISES A BIG CROP OF GARBANZO

Guaymas, Sonora, Mexico, March 11.—Francisco Echevarria, of Sinaloa, has planted this year 40 sacks of garbanzo from which he expects a harvest of 2000 bags. Next season Mr. Echevarria intends to clear 600 additional hectares of land and to plant 400 hectares more to garbanzo. He estimates next year's crop at 4000 bags. Mr. Echevarria also has a ranch at Tamazula, and thinks he will harvest 150 bags of garbanzo from this land. His entire output of garbanzo will be shipped from Naranjo station.

J. A. Small is in the city on his way to Guadalupe to take up his duties as superintendent of the Guadalupe division of the S. P. de M. Mr. Small succeeded J. B. Sparks who has been compelled on account of ill health to give up his work for the present.

Dr. E. A. Caulfield left Guaymas this morning for Sinaloa where he will remain for some time. The Sonora Copper Smelting company, which owns 10,000 acres of land near Noria station contemplates bringing a party of home-seekers here in a few days, and it is the intention to cut the land up into smaller tracts.

JAILS FOR SIERRA BLANCA

CLINT AND SOCORRO TOWNSHIPS. Clint and Sierra Blanca as well as Socorro are to be provided with cages for their jail. The county commissioners decided this Monday afternoon at which time they also appropriated \$150 for the improvement of the Fabens-Torillo road.

County treasurer J. D. Foster is now paying cash for jury scrips up to the number 45,538, which includes all scrip registered up to January 11. Altogether \$27,000 is being paid.
