URGES PENSIONS FOR THE WIDOWS

Overthrow of Diaz Gave Mothers' Congress Work A Setback in Mexico.

St. Louis, Mo., March 22.—Pensioning of widowed and deserted mothers, rather than the placing of their children in charitable institutions, was urged by Miss Mary S. Garrett, chairman of the department of legislation in an address before the Mothers' National congress.

Miss Garrett, connected with the probation association and juvenile court of Philadelphia, spoke in favor of the bill for the establishment of a federal children's bureau. The measure has passed the United States senate.

Mrs. Frederick Schoeff, of Philadelphia, president, told of the establishment of state organizations in several states and in Cuba. The movement had received a setback in Mexico, she told the delegates, because of the overthrow of the Diaz administration.

MAN WHO FIRED THE FATAL SHOT IS FREE

So Say Witnesses Heard In Murder Investigation

Papers in the case of Jose Pantola, charged with the murder of Porfirio Lopez, who was shot in the forehead in A. B. C. alley last Sunday, and died at the county hospital Wednesday, will be sent to the grand jury today. In the preliminary hearing before justice E. B. McClintock Thursday afternoon witnesses testified that Teodoro Rodriguez had seen the shooting. He has not been arrested.

Pantola and Rodriguez were in a house on A. B. C. alley with two Mexican women Sunday afternoon when Jose Ureia and Porfirio Lopez entered. The latter was looking for a woman named Josefina, and Rodriguez told them she was not there. Then, it is asserted, Lopez struck Rodriguez and the shooting occurred.
