Oakland, Cal., March 22.—Henry, better known as "Iceman" Spencer, famous as a jockey when Tod Sloan, "Skeets" Martin and Clem Jenkins were at their best, died yesterday of tuberculosis. He was in comfortable circumstances, having saved much of the fortune which he accumulated 19 years ago when riding for big fees.
