Jury Takes Action of El Paso on Visitors.

In El Paso, the jury presiding over the case of the Sells-Floto show is as spick and span, brand new as its street parade—and it is—the owners have sent a circus out of Denver this spring that makes noise like a real tented aggregation of world wonders.

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IS NOT A RIGHT BUT A PRIVILEGE

So Says Naturalization Examiner; Many Are Made Americans.

Becoming a citizen of the United States is a privilege and not a right of any person. This statement was made by F. F. Graves, United States naturalization examiner for the state of Texas, in the 24th district court Monday afternoon in the hearing of several cases. It is a ruling of the supreme court of the United States. Final papers were granted Monday afternoon to Pierre Casenabe, better known as Felix Robert, a retired bull fighter; Faustino Armentariz, who has lived in the country 25 years, and to Carl A. Anderson, who has lived here since five years, surviving him are applicants, the applications for citizenship made by four men were dismissed. They were Charles Ervin Zahn, Max Coleman, Sam Buxbaum and Carl Leonard Knick, while the application of Wm. Christ, a soldier, was dismissed because it was filed when he had been but two years in the country.

She had lived over 20 years in El Paso. The funeral services will be held Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, from 110 North Campbell street, Rev. Perry J. Rice, officiating. The interment will be in Concordia cemetery. Mrs. Bolgiano is survived by a son and daughter, Mrs. S. D. Clifford, of El Paso.

ROBERT F. GREEN. Robert F. Green, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Green, of 167 Willow street, died Monday morning. The funeral service was held from the home, Monday afternoon and the burial was in Concordia cemetery.

HERBERT L. BOWKER. Herbert L. Bowker, 55 years old, died Sunday afternoon at a local hospital. No funeral arrangements have been made pending instructions from his relatives of his home in Vermont. He had been in El Paso but a short time, and has no relatives here.

MANHATTAN HEIGHTS BOUGHT IN A LUMP

Syndicate Pays \$100,000 for 135 Acres in El Paso; to Improve It at Once.

Manhattan Heights, adjoining Highland park, on the east end of Alford park on the south, has been bought from Judge L. C. Densar, of New York, by a syndicate composed of Winchester Cooley, Dr. J. B. Brady and others for \$100,000. The addition contains 135 acres of highland surrounding the old federal school. The land is to be leveled, water mains laid, a street car line run through it from the Highland park line, sidewalks and sewer mains laid and the entire tract made into a high-class residential district.
