SPECIALTIES WHERE CONDITION SHOWS AN INCREASE

Advance in General Electric and International Harvester—Steel Better Self.

New York, N. Y., April 9.—Specialties became prominent in the second hour of the stock market today. General Electric advanced 3/4 and International Harvester 3/4. Rumors of an extra dividend were circulated in connection with the former, while the latter's miller dissolution report was associated with the Harvester's rise. Louisville National gained 1/2, Reading Iron and Steel, common and preferred, gained 1/4 and 2/4 respectively.

The market was at the best at noon, with especial strength in Union Pacific and the Southern roads, while United States Steel showed signs of another upward movement.

Bonds were steady. An active buying movement cropped out in Reading which gave a better tone to the whole market. The copper producers' report for March, showing a decrease of about \$70,000 pounds in supplies on hand, had no adverse effect. Further improvement was recorded by United States Steel, Reading Iron and Steel, Louisville & Nashville and some of the specialties.

The market closed strong. The last hour's business was uneventful save for a rise in Louisville & Nashville to 167 and Reading to 169 1/2. Final prices were well up to the best figures of the day.

PRIMARIES UNDER WAY IN ILLINOIS

Chicago, Ill., April 9.—Illinois citizens went to the polls today to cast their ballots in the most momentous primary content ever seen in the state. For the first time a direct expression of preference for a presidential candidate on the Republican and Democratic tickets is possible to the voters, and supporters of president Taft, Col. Roosevelt and senator La Follette, Republicans and Champ Clark and Woodrow Wilson, Democrats, were busy with the opening of the polls.

HUERTA STILL IN MEXICO CITY?

As Late as Last Thursday No Force Had Been Assembled for Him to Lead. Despite all reports from Mexican federal sources, and the belief of the rebels around Jimenez, Gen. Huerta is probably not anywhere near Torreón, nor have any important bodies of federal troops left Mexico City for the north.

As late as last Thursday, Imparcial of Mexico City, printed the following news item: Victoriano Huerta cannot leave the capital until the secretary of war has concentrated all the troops in the north.

"We know today federal forces will commence to arrive to be concentrated in this place. Applied to the north, has been made for quarters for the troops.

"Among the troops that will arrive are the 12th, the command of Col. Reynaldo Diaz, and the 15th, under command of Gen. Augustin A. Valdes. A regiment of cavalry will also accompany them.

"I have not said to any reporter, nor anyone, that would not go to the frontier of the north. It behoves me as a soldier to obey unconditionally the orders which I receive from my superiors, and so as I have done, am doing and will do."

If Gen. Huerta is anywhere near Torreón with a force of men, he must have left Mexico very suddenly and unexpectedly since last Thursday. On March 28, more than two weeks ago, the government sent out word that Huerta had already left for the north with an army corps to put down the rebellion.

An Old Story. Today the Times prints an account from the United States of a general's report from Mexico (no name given, as usual) of a battle at Ascension, on Sunday, April 6. On page 1 of the El Paso Herald, of Thursday, April 4, a full account of the same battle was printed. It really occurred on Sunday, March 25, more than two weeks ago. At Colonia Diaz mailed the particulars immediately. The Herald does not depend upon "stirring passengers" for news, but has its correspondents on the scene.

EXPLOSION DAMAGES HOUCK ASSAY OFFICE

An explosion of chemicals in the assay office of H. Houck, on North Oregon street at 2-45 p. m. Tuesday, damaged the interior of the building. The explosion broke the front windows and scattered the contents of the office. The assay office is in the row of buildings between the tracks, which are covered with metal and are the department had hard work to prevent the fire spreading.

New York, N. Y., April 9.—The statement of the Copper Producers' association for March shows a decrease of stocks on hand of \$72,442 pounds compared with the previous month. Production for the month was 123,454,481 pounds, an increase of 9,528,283 domestic deliveries, 67,487,466, an increase of 11,259,994 foreign deliveries, 33,967,000, an increase of 9,528,283 total deliveries, 128,767,032, an increase of 6,850,568.
