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HELP GOOD ROADS SOUTH MOVEMENT WHEN IS A BI-PLANE NOT A BI-PLANE

A. A. A. Tour, Formerly the Glidden, Is a Great Boon to Progressive Work.

In deciding upon New Orleans as the terminus for its annual national rally last year the American Automobile association had in mind the arduous accelerating of the good roads movement in the south, which, with its emphasis on the great value of improved highways, has been outstripping other sections of the country in road building. The northern city which shall serve as the starting place of the tour has not yet been selected, but of several mentioned, the most prominent are Indianapolis, Detroit and Chicago, though a beginning at Minneapolis and St. Paul is looked upon with favor.
