American Railroads Carry Nearly One Billion Passengers Yearly

Work of the Interstate Commerce Commission is to Regulate Common Carriers and Adjust Rate Differences.

REGULATING as it does the affairs of common carrier corporations having an annual income of approximately \$4,000,000,000, the interstate commerce commission is one of the most important of the independent branches of the government service.

During a recent year over 700 hearings and investigations were made. A large number of these were held in Washington, though the commission or certain of its members are in various parts of the country to hold hearings when it is not convenient for the interested parties to come to Washington.

One of the principal functions of the commission is to settle differences between the common carriers and their patrons. In doing this, it receives two kinds of complaints, formal and informal. Informal complaints are largely in the nature of about 200,000 of these nature are filed annually.

Another important function of the commission is to regulate the rates of the railroads and other common carriers of the country, and of gathering statistics relative to their operations. Realizing that unless a uniform system of accounting be adopted, it would be impossible for the commission to do its work efficiently.

During an average year approximately 250,000 formal complaints are filed with the commission. These are disposed of by the commission in a number of ways. Some are referred to the Interstate Commerce Commission, some to the Federal Trade Commission, and some to the Federal Reserve Board.

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STEEVER'S FRIENDS ASK HIS PROMOTION

Start Movement to Have the Fourth Cavalry Commander Made General.

MEXICAN JUDGES FOR SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION, BUT NO CANDIDATES YET.

Formal Call For Election on May 4 and Election Officers Named.

Mexican judges at an election for three new members of the school board held in the Mesa school building on Monday night. The election will be held on May 4. They will be in the lower districts of the city and there are to be seven of them acting in this capacity.

A formal call for the election was ordered issued at a meeting of the school board held in the Mesa school building Monday night, which was attended by trustees W. H. Winter, Dr. E. H. Irvin, F. B. Simmons and W. C. White and superintendent N. R. Cramer and auditor F. E. Sawyer.

The water department of the city again requested that a bill for \$1525 for water furnished the schools during the month of November be paid, but it was laid on the table. The trustees said they had no way to pay it, as the treasurer would not honor a warrant if it were drawn. Mayor Kelly suggested a few days ago that he could withhold this amount next year and they agreed this was the only way it could be paid.

No Candidates Yet.

Who are to be the candidates at the school election has not been determined. Voting places are being fixed. It would be a candidate for reelection said: "Positively not. I am not a candidate for anything." Dr. E. H. Irvin is a candidate for reelection, but he is not but said that he believed he would not come back. John H.
