MORE DEFINITE PLAN FOR RESCUE HOME

Mrs. Estill to Address El Pasoans Thursday on Work in This City.

More definite plans will be made for the projected rescue home for girls in El Paso with the return Thursday of Mrs. Thomas Estill, Salvation army adjutant in charge of the girls rescue work for the Chicago district of the army. Mrs. Estill some weeks ago met with El Paso women and business men and outlined the work of establishing a home here, which many are determined must be done at once.

At 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon, Mrs. Estill will speak before a meeting of men and women in the auditorium of the First Christian church. She will be introduced by judge A. S. J. Elyar. Mrs. W. L. Crockett, head of the rescue home committee, has sent out 100 invitations to El Paso business and professional men, but all in any way interested are asked to attend the meeting. The plan of having separate meetings for men and women has been given up.

Mrs. Estill is returning from a trip to Los Angeles, and will proceed home to Chicago.

SAYS TRAINS TO BE RUNNING BY SEPT. 1

Tucson Extension Work Is Making Rapid Progress, Says Tinkler.

Trains will be running over the Tucson extension by Sept. 1, Supt. C. C. Tinkler's prediction holds water as well as his former estimates have. Of the 98 miles of construction on the extension, 85 per cent of the work is now completed by the grading crews and the remaining shovel work on the west end of the line will be completed in time for the track laying crews, when they arrive from the east, where they are now working.

The track is now laid up to the San Pedro bridge, west of Fairbank, and the four steel spans are ready to be set over the San Pedro. Mr. Tinkler says. It will require 10 days for this steel work when the track laying crew will start on the track laying west of the bridge and will continue to Tucson.

If the track laying operations are not interfered with in any way the line will be open before Sept. 1 and the regular train schedule will be established by that date, the man on the job, who is Supt. Tinkler, says.



AWARD OF REPARATION MADE AGAINST PENNSYLVANIA R. R.
Washington, D. C., April 24.—An award of reparation against the Pennsylvania Railroad company, in five cases amounting to \$129,722, was made today by the interstate commerce commission.

The commission found the railroad guilty of unlawful discrimination in the distribution of coal car equipment, by reason of which coal companies had been unable fairly to market their products.

The commission established a new principle by awarding damages in these cases. Heretofore, such matters have been referred to the courts.
