



TEXAS MAN INSANE; TRIES TO KILL SELF

Jumps Into Railroad Water Tank Containing 20 Feet of Water.

Phoenix, Ariz., May 15.—Deputy sheriff A. W. Howe, of Tombstone, arrived here Sunday night with three insane patients for the hospital and three men sentenced to the penitentiary. One of the insane patients is a woman, Mrs. Mary Callahan, 41 years old. Another is a Mexican and the third a man who claims to have come from Texas, although he is unable to remember the name of the town. His name is Charles Tobin. He was taken by the officials at Bowie's station, where he had become violent while eating dinner, rushing from the eating house, climbing the ladder to the top of the railroad water tank and diving into the tank from a manhole. It was with difficulty that he was saved from drowning as the water in the tank is 20 feet deep.


